CANON TUCKER SPEAKS
ON "MISSION WORK"

Large Audience Listened to Interesting Address in Huron College Last Night.

Canon Tucker continued his lecture on mission work in India before a large audience at Huron College last night, taking as his theme, "Methods and Results." He showed that the course usually pursued by a missionary was to learn the language, and then go about in the cities and towns, among the street fairs, and other public gatherings, and talk to the people. When he got acquainted with the mission, he secured a little house and put forth a sign telling who and what he was. The people were invited to the house, and usually came in small numbers at first, but gradually increased. A certain number continued to come more or less regularly, and often brought others. When a sufficient number came a church was organized. Dr. Tucker dwelt on the importance of the schools for boys and girls and the colleges for older students are doing to break down the superstition in which India abounds. The hospitals and various homes have been one of the most valuable aids to the missionaries in their work, and are increasingly so. In concluding, Dr. Tucker spoke of the good work women missionaries do among the women of India.

MINER'S CONVENTION
FINISHES BUSINESS

Negotiations Left in Hands of Three Executive Boards.

Scranton, Pa., March 25.—Having reaffirmed the position they took last October, and having again formulated certain demands which have been rejected by the mine operators, the delegates decided to remain at work while the district officers of the union make another effort to reach an agreement with the employers. The delegates to the district convention of the United Mine Workers returned to their homes today.

The whole matter of negotiating an agreement with the operators is now in the hands of the three executive boards of the anthracite region, and it is probable that a conference with the coal road presidents will take place next week.
