IS LOST BALLOON IN NORTH ONTARIO?

Party Arrived to Make Thorough Search For America II.

THE CREW ALL MISSING

Considerable Anxiety Is Felt Over the Non-Appearance of Big Balloon, as the Others Have All Turned Up.

New York, Oct. 23.—Edmund M. Stratton, of New York, representing the Aero Club of America, will arrive in Ottawa, Ont., today, to take active charge of the work of searching for the missing balloon America II, and its occupants, Ala R. Hawley and Augustus Post.

Mr. Stratton is accompanied by William Hawley, brother of the missing balloonist. They have credentials to the Governor-General of Canada, and a letter from Cortland T. Field, Bishop of the Aero Club of America, requesting that every possible assistance be rendered them in their work.

Systematic Search. They will organize a central bureau in Ottawa, and will immediately engage the services of two civil engineers, to plan relief expeditions. All the other information thus far gathered will be collected together with the Canadian Government's weather report in an effort to place as nearly as possible the course which the balloon probably took.

They will confer in Canada with Lewis Spindler, who has been sent to Toronto by the St. Louis Aero Club. The Aero Club officials will be in charge of the New York end of the search. They are still hopeful that some message may be received from the aeronauts within the next 24 hours, telling of a safe landing in the northern wilds.

The course of the America II, as mapped out by the Aero Club officials, and the aeronauts were in the possession, seems to lie through the country beyond the Georgian Bay. This is the wildest kind of a wilderness, and the aeronauts were completely alone to drop there they may be a long time getting back to civilization.

May Break Records. To officers of the Aero Club here, it seems very probable that Messrs. Stratton and Post have surpassed all the other records made, and that they will eventually be located several hundred miles further from the starting point than anticipated.

Both are experienced balloonists, and men of iron constitutions, easily able to withstand the hardships of a prolonged flight; both expressed a determination to keep in the air as long as their balloons could gain distance; both believed that the longest records heretofore made could be far surpassed. They have both exercised good judgment in conserving their gas and ballast, keeping their position, and landing carefully.

WINNIPEG BROKER ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

W. F. Whellams Found Dead Beside a Fence.

Winnipeg, Oct. 23.—Mr. W. F. Whellams, manager of the brokerage firm of J. J. C. Cox & Co., Winnipeg, was instantly killed on Saturday by the accidental discharge of his shotgun while hunting. Whellams, accompanied by his young nephew, was going to his home in East Kildonan from his brother's farm, a few miles out, and it is supposed that he was climbing through a fence when the trigger caught. He was found lying beside the fence, the entire charge having entered his breast just below the armpit. His wife and only child, aged seven months, sailed from Liverpool on the Canada on Saturday, returning after a visit to relatives. Mr. Whellams was a well-known businessman, and a partner in the firm of which he was manager for many years.

WHITE SLAVER WAS SENT FOR TRIAL

It Is Said That Two Girls Were Lured Away By Him.

Winnipeg, Oct. 23.—John Bratton was sent for trial on Saturday on a charge of procuring. He brought two girls, one Maude Pearce, only sixteen, from Crookston, and promised marriage and the other came to Winnipeg as a bride. He forced them into the "red light" district and a life of shame. They were taken to Brandon, Moosejaw and Medicine Hat.

Her father, in the meantime, was hunting for the girl, and Bratton, who had lived on the proceeds of her immoral life, was arrested through the immigration office.
