### PARIS BUZZING WITH SENSATION

German Action in Morocco Still the Great Topic.

**FERMENT IN CABINET**

Premier Caillaux Has Taken Up the Matter With Great Britain.

[Canadian Press.]  
Paris, July 3.—The sensation caused by Germany's action in sending a warship to Agadir shows little signs of abating to-day, and diplomatic circles are said to be in a state of profound ferment.

Premier Caillaux and Minister of Foreign Affairs De Zelves had a long conference together last night at the foreign office, and later it was announced that the foreign minister would not accompany President Caillaux on his official visit to Holland today, as originally planned, his place being taken by M. Caillaux, minister of commerce.

To Answer Germany.  
It is stated that an official reply will be made to Germany's communication before Tuesday. The cabinet will meet to decide the terms of the reply, and the Government wishes also to have in its possession before the views of the cabinet of England and Russia. Paul Cambon, the French ambassador at London, has been instructed to place himself in communication with Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary, and he will call on Sir Edward today.

Public opinion, as voiced by the French newspapers, does not appear inclined to be alarmed, in the belief that it will await calmly and coolly another and more precise statement from Germany. The reply of Foreign Minister De Zelves to the German ambassador, as reported by the Temps, is generally considered as expressing effectively the sentiments of the French public. According to the Temps, M. De Zelves declared that he could not conceal the surprise and regret which the action of Germany had caused him. Without exaggeration of the gravity of affairs, he pointed out that the manner chosen by the Imperial Government to manifest its anxiety for German interests in Morocco was likely to seem strange to French opinion. The minister declared that he was always ready to confer with the British government and to offer assistance with foreign powers, but that he continued ready to confer, but that he had the duty of a warship to Agadir was not calculated to facilitate an eventful conference.

Ready, the French foreign minister continued, to the German ambassador the impression that the decision of the Imperial Government, communicated to France after its execution, at the moment the new Government was taking office, and on the eve of the departure of President Poincaré, seemed not certainly of a nature to create a grave situation, but was hardly in conformity with the agreement of 1904, to treat each other with mutual confidence and cordiality.

The Temps does not believe that Morocco will ever again serve as a battlefield for European discord, and is of the opinion that the whole affair will be ended by negotiations.

### THREE INJURED IN DRUMBO WRECK

Freight Car Turns Turtle and Goes Over Embankment.

**TAKES THIRTY-FOOT DROP**

A Defective Rail Said to Have Been the Cause of the Accident.

Drumbo, July 2.—A defective rail is said to have caused the derailment of the rear cars of a way freight on the Grand Trunk at a point three miles west of Drumbo about 9:50 yesterday morning.

Nothing wrong was noticed at Bright, but when three miles out of this place the rear part of the train jolted and the caboose left the rails. The next cars remained on the roadbed, but after tearing up the track for fifteen rods, it also turned turtle and dropped thirty feet. This happened on a thirty-foot embankment, and three men in the caboose were injured.

James Mitchell, one of the three, was struck on head by some flying object when the caboose turned over, and he was rendered unconscious. There is a hole in the base of the brain, and his left hand was crushed. His companions were more fortunate, one escaping with a scalp wound, the other with a hand and a leg.

The engine of the freight ran back to Drumbo and an auxiliary was sent from Stratford.

The train was travelling at considerable speed and the two cars rolled down the embankment, while the trucks buried themselves in the road ballast. The upper part of the caboose was reduced to kindling wood.

Dr. J. A. Mitchell, of Drumbo, was hurried to the scene, and James Mitchell was taken to the hospital. It is thought that he will recover.

"Traffic was suspended for some hours between Paris Junction and Stratford, but the service resumed about the middle of the afternoon."
