Committee Appointed at Meeting Thursday to Confer With
Power Commission—Road Has Largest Business
in Its History.

Extensive improvements are to be undertaken by the London and Lake Erie Transportation Company.

At a meeting of the directors held in this city yesterday, when the season's business was reported to have been the largest in the history of the road, a committee was appointed to open negotiations with the hydro-electric commission to secure rates for the using of Niagara energy on the line to Port Stanley. The committee will make a report within a short time.

EXTEND TRACKS OF L. & P. S. ROAD

Ald. Bennet Has Plans He
Thinks Would Help
City.

TO SECURE INDUSTRIES
Would Have Land Purchased in Eastern
Section of City for Factory
Sites.

There will be a meeting of the London and Port Stanley Board in the near future to deal with the suggestion made by Ald. Bennett that a piece of land be purchased in the eastern section of the city to extend the tracks of the London and Port Stanley, and also to provide factory sites.

The idea has met with universal favor throughout London, and it is considered to be the best possible solution to the problem of securing industries.

Ald. Bennett has been working on the matter for some days, and is convinced that the proposal is an excellent one.

"The city has simply got to take up," he stated, "there is need of a progressive policy for industries, and it is time that something was done to keep London in the procession."

"I am of the opinion that the citizens will vote to dispose of the London and Port Stanley road, and it is one of the best assets we have, and by adopting the scheme suggested, we would increase the value of our own property and at the same time bring many people to the city. There is plenty of land there, and we could get it at a reasonable rate."

WORK TO RECOMMENCE
ON GODERICH RAILWAY
Large Consignment of Material Has Arrived for New Line in North.

LONDON MONEY MARKETS.
London, Nov. 10.—Money was in better demand, and discount rates hardened in sympathy today. The stock market was irregular. The appearance of the 42,000,000 Southern Nigeria loan and Brierley money caused losses in other securities. Mining shares were mostly lower, but copper stocks closed strong. American securities opened quiet and steady, and a fraction above parity. SENSATION IN ANGLICAN CIRCLES

"High Church" Literature Distributed at Toronto.

MORE ELABORATE RITUAL
Restoration of the Eucharist in the
Church of England Aimed At.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 10.—Consternation has been thrown into the evangelical camp of the Church of England in Toronto by the gratuitous distribution of a quantity of "high church" literature among the members of the synod. This literature is in the form of a pamphlet entitled "Manuals for the Million," and it deals with the meaning of ritual of the real presence and the holy sacrifice.

It is from the pen of Rev. Paul B. Bull, M. A., of the Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield, Yorkshire. Author Bull has been in Toronto, and it is understood that he intends returning here. The evangelical branch of the Church of England has a long and bitter history of opposition to the ritual of the real presence, and it is believed that the distribution of this literature is a challenge to the high church party.

A prefatory note to the pamphlet states that it was one of a number written in the hope that they might do something to restore the holy eucharist to its proper place in our church's worship.

"Belief in the real presence of our Lord in the blessed sacrament of his body and blood," continues the preface, "is closely allied to a right belief in the incarnation. Those who have abandoned the one have often lost the other. Belief in the real presence is an abiding protest against materialism, and more rationalism, for it unconsciously proclaims the supernatural in these holy mysteries."

"Sometimes people sneer at ritual, as 'bowing and scraping,' and 'man millinery and effeminacy.' But the time spent on ritual of divine worship is in a good cause, for it is the time spent on ritual in the army and navy. When men say that ritual is unmanly, the facts of life contradict them absolutely. The Freemasons have a most elaborate ceremonial. The Oddfellows and other friendly societies wear bright colored sashes and stoles and aprons, and carry splendid banners."

DEATH OF T. L. LEWIS
Manitoba Manager of Northern Life
Company Dead at Winnipeg.

Word was received this morning of the death of Mr. T. L. Lewis, provincial manager of the Northern Life Assurance Company, following an operation. Mr. Lewis was 72 years of age and had been in Winnipeg over eight years. In early life Mr. Lewis was a drygoods merchant in Chatham, later removing to Toronto, from which place he became connected with the Federal Life, and during the past ten years with the Northern Life. Mr. Lewis was one of the most genial of men and scrupulously honorable in all his dealings. His wife predeceased him about two years. He is survived by two sons, Mr. O. L. Lewis, K. C., of Chatham, and another son in British Columbia, and one daughter, Mrs. Lennox, of Toronto. Interment will take place at Toronto.

COURT DECIDES FOR DR. WORKMAN

Montreal, Nov. 10.—Judge Weir, in a lengthy judgment today, rendered his decision in the famous Workman case, condemning the defendants to pay Dr. Workman \$5,500 and all the costs in the case.
Dr. Workman sued the Western College for \$5,000 for wrongful dismissal, and the case has been something of a sensation from the start, owing to the prominence of clerical witnesses called upon to testify.
During the reading of the judgment, Hon. Mr. Justice Weir commented in rather severe terms upon the testimony given by some of the reverend gentlemen.

LAW TAKES FIVE CHILDREN FROM NEGLECTFUL FATHER

Little Ones Found To Be Insufficiently Fed, Clothed and
Educated—William Edward Brooks Severely
Reprimanded at Aylmer.

Aylmer, Nov. 10.—William Edward Brooks, a farmer residing on con. 8, Malahide Township, and reported to be worth from \$25,000 to \$34,000, was tried before County Magistrate Hunt and found guilty on a charge of neglecting to properly feed, clothe and educate his eight children.

Poorly Fed.
It was shown that two of the children were suffering from rickets, a disease of the bone, supposed to have been caused from neglect in their early feeding. These children were aged 6 years and 3 months, respectively.

It was also shown that the children were not properly clothed, and that the father was unable to provide for their education.

The children were taken into the care of the Aylmer Children's Hospital at Toronto and the expense charged to Brooks. Four of the children were ordered to be taken to the Children's Shelter at St. Thomas, and were removed there after trial by Inspector Shaw, who, with Dr. Reason, of Aylmer, and Mrs. Roy, a

neighbor of Brooks, was the principal witness. The hearing was behind closed doors, but it was afterwards given out that the magistrate severely censured Brooks.

Brooks' Defence.
In defence Brooks claimed that the conditions revealed were the result of the long illness of his wife, who died a few weeks ago. Before that time, Brooks claimed she had been slightly demented, and that he found it practically impossible to secure anyone to do the housework and care for the children.

It was stated that the witnesses testified that the home of Brooks was in a most filthy condition, and that at least five of the children were in a dangerous state of health, which they attributed directly to lack of nourishment and proper care. The three oldest children were sent back to the home with their father, and he was warned that they must be properly looked after. Brooks is generally known as a prosperous farmer, well able to provide plenty of food for his children and to educate them.

WHIRLED AROUND SHAFTING
WINGHAM YOUTH INJURED
William Jarvis Had Terrifying Experience When His Sleeve
Caught in Machinery as He Was Up On
Ladder Oiling.

Wingham, Nov. 9.—William Jarvis, a young man employed at the Wingham Foundry, had a miraculous escape from death at the factory this afternoon when, while up on a ladder oiling some shafting, the sleeve of his coat caught in a set screw and he was whirled around on a rapidly revolving shaft. Jarvis, with rare presence of mind, braced himself as his feet struck the ceiling and was able to prevent himself from being twisted up in the belting, in which case he would have been torn to pieces in an instant. As it was his clothes were ripped completely off and torn to shreds in the shafting. Some of the employees heard Jarvis' cries, and on seeing what had happened at once stopped the machinery. When rescued from the place where he had braced himself Jarvis collapsed. He was rushed to his home, where the entire portion of his left arm had been stripped off, and was hanging by a mere thread. In addition Jarvis had contusions and bruises. He suffered greatly from shock, and will be laid up for some time. A number of burns were found about his body, and it is supposed these were caused by the speed with which the whirling shaft tore the clothing off.

POPULATION OF LONDON IS FORTY-SIX THOUSAND

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—Census Commissioner Blue has discovered the mistake in the census figures for the city of London, and it is now shown authentically that the Forest City has a population of but 46,177.

It was at first thought that the loss of one thousand people was due to a mistake at Ottawa, but upon checking the totals of the local commissioner it was shown that there are but 13,887 people in the third ward of London instead of 13,987.

The further investigation since the first announcement of the population of London was brought about by the fact that London was credited with one thousand less than the London official claimed.

BALFOUR'S SUCCESSOR
MAY BE CANADIAN
Andrew Bonar Law Seems
Likely to Be Unionist
Leader.

London, Nov. 10.—In the lobby of the House of Commons this afternoon it was regarded as being practically assured that Andrew Bonar Law would be unanimously selected at a caucus on Monday as Unionist leader in the House of Commons, in succession to Arthur J. Balfour, whose resignation was announced Nov. 8.

The campaign in the respective camps of J. Austen Chamberlain and Walter Hume Long developed such bitterness of feeling that soon it was evident that the selection of one of them at the expense of the other would leave behind too many raw places.

Mr. Law, who comes from New Brunswick, only entered Parliament in 1906, and has since been a member of the division of Camberwell in the last general election to fight in Northwest Manchester on the tariff reform platform, but failed of election, and in March last found a safe seat in the Boodle division of Lancashire, southwest.

IS GERMAN CROWN PRINCE AT HEAD OF A WAR PARTY?

Berlin Press Roundly Scores Kaiser's Heir For His Openly Ex-
pressed Hostility to Great Britain In the Sensational
Reichstag Debate of Thursday.

Berlin, Nov. 10.—The attitude of Crown Prince Frederick William during yesterday's debate in the Reichstag, when he openly demonstrated his measure over and approval of the criticisms of Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg's policy in the Moroccan affair with France, and applauded the sabre-rattling passages in the fiery speeches, is sharply condemned today by not only the friends but the opponents of the chancellor.

The Berliner Tageblatt, the Vossische Zeitung, the Vorwaerts, the Cologne Gazette, and the Frankfurter Zeitung join in denouncing the incident as a frivolous and dangerous exhibition. The papers see an occasion for serious concern when the heir to the throne so demonstratively shows his disagreement with the policy of the Emperor and his responsible advisers; and

express the fear that the impression has been given abroad that the future Emperor is heading a German war party.

Talk of Resignation.
The Vossische Zeitung wonders why Herr von Bethmann-Hollweg did not resign after such a demonstration. The Emperor had the crown prince attend the dinner which his majesty gave in honor of the imperial chancellor and his wife last night.

This stand by the press may result in a strengthening of the position of the chancellor, which was badly shaken when the post-up fury born of the popular feeling that Germany had backed down before British menace, was vented in the Reichstag yesterday. The chancellor sought to explain that Germany has attained the object which she had in view when the gunboat Panther was sent to Agadir; that the Franco-German treaty terminated French hostility, and that Germany had concluded the prolonged negotiations with honor and advantage.

Frost King Is Headed This Way

10,000 TROOPS JOIN THE REBELS

Another Big Loss to Chinese
Imperialists By Desertion.

BATTLE ON AT NANKING
Royalists Strongly Entrenched, and
May Have To Be Starved
Out.

Shanghai, Nov. 10.—Advices just received say that fighting occurred yesterday at Tsin-Kiang-Pu, in the Province of Kiang-Su. The revolutionaries were successful and 10,000 imperial troops went over to the cause of reform.

The governor of Anhwei Province has promised to raise the white flag today.

London, Nov. 10.—A Peking dispatch to the Times says that Prince Su, of the board of dependencies, and ex-chief of the naval department, denies that the court contemplates flight. He places confidence in Yuan Shi Kai and is convinced that the issue in Peking will be bloodless.

A Hong Kong dispatch to the Times says it is learned that all the provinces will be taken by the rebels except Ho-Nan, which will be left alone out of respect to Yuan Shi Kai.

Serious at Tien Tsin.
London, Nov. 10.—The situation at Tien Tsin appears to have grown more serious. Despatches today say that ball cartridges have been issued to the legion guards.

The Fight at Nanking.
Nanking, Nov. 10.—The night passed without incident except a few demonstrations by the reformers, who were endeavoring to draw the fire of the entrenched imperialists and induce a waste of ammunition. It looks now as if the situation might become a Continued on Page Ten.

GODERICH PLANS BIG NEW HOSPITAL

Handsone Home of Late Hon.
M. C. Cameron To Be
Remodelled.

Goderich, Nov. 10.—The annual meeting of the board of the Goderich Alexandra and Marine Hospital was held in the court house last night, and a number of leading citizens were present. Goderich has outgrown the present hospital, and from the annual report may be gathered the fact that this hospital has been a success from the very beginning, and is constantly filled, so that the board are now contemplating building a much larger building to supply the demands.

Plans for the remodeling of the beautiful and spacious residence of the late Hon. M. C. Cameron were before the board last night. This is considered an ideal spot for a hospital, as it has large grounds and has an isolated position, with the splendid outlook over the Malheur River.

The board intends asking the town of Goderich to pass a by-law at the January elections to give the hospital board \$15,000 to remodel and equip the building in the most modern and up-to-date wards and operating room.

RADIAL ROAD TO TUNNEL TOWN

Power May Be Generated by
Dam in Aux-Sauble
River.

EIGHTY FOOT STRUCTURE
May Enter the City at Some Point
on Northwest Side.

More extensive preparations for the construction of the radial railway between London and Sarnia are being made and plans are now being arranged for the generation of electric power by means of an immense dam in the Aux-Sauble River at Rock Glen in West Williams Township.

The dam is to be 80-foot affair, and it is understood that it will be constructed at a point where there is already a natural waterfall that has been utilized for some time for hydro-power purposes in the operation of mills in the township.

The dam scheme is one that will require considerable expenditure, it is alleged, as the river will be affected for about twenty miles. It may be necessary to raise or rebuild many bridges, and allowance will have to be made for possible flood claims along the course of the stream.

The Right-of-Way.
The right-of-way for the railway has already been surveyed between London and Sarnia, and many rumors regarding the point at which the line will strike London have been afloat.

It is understood, however, that the company will endeavor to obtain permission to follow the Sarnia gravel road as nearly as possible, and enter London from the northwest side. As the present county council has but one more session ahead of it, the concluding gathering at which no new business will be taken up, it is thought that the matter will be brought up seriously before that body until after the elections at the first of the year.

WINGHAM CASE UP IN GODERICH COURT

Andrew Cruickshanks Is Now
On Trial for Hurling File
at Pretty Girl.

Goderich, Nov. 10.—Andrew Cruickshanks, of Wingham, was arraigned in court here today on a charge of having assaulted Miss Frances Davis, also of Wingham. The hearing took place before Judge Holt in the criminal court, and a large number of witnesses from Wingham have yet to be heard. Miss Davis, who is a prepossessing young woman, stated that Cruickshanks was in the habit of calling at the store in which she worked and paying her attentions. She was walking down the street one evening in company with a gentleman friend. Cruickshanks passed them as they were looking into a drug store window. He turned and buried a large file directly at her head. She dodged it and escaped with only slight injury, but the file was thrown with such force that it went through the plate glass window, through the glass sash behind, and through another window behind that again, and landed in the drug store.
