SHORT CIRCUIT DID MUCH DAMAGE TO HYDRO PROPERTY

Much Difficulty Experienced
in Locating the Site of
Trouble.

Damage approximating \$600 was incurred by the public utilities commission Wednesday evening, when a short circuit on the hydro line, between the Ridout street station and Hyman's tannery caused several switches in the former building to burn. During repair of the damage at the station hydro was off throughout the city, while those in the tannery and other factories and homes in the immediate vicinity are without electric power, and will be until the break in the hydro line is located and repaired. The break is difficult to locate, as the feed line is located in an underground ditch.

Several switches were ignited at the Ridout street station when the short circuit occurred, and both private and public telephone systems at the station were thrown out of commission. The oil on the switches burned for several minutes before workmen could extinguish it.

In addition to the damage at the station, feed lines to the building "broke down" in a dozen places, according to General Manager E. V. Buchanan, who likened the shock of the short circuit on other feed lines to an auto going over a large bump in the road.

It is hoped that by segregating portions of the feed line to the tannery, and testing them, the break can be located by linemen at once, and repaired with minimum inconvenience to consumers.

THIRD TEST WELL FOR WATER BEING DRILLED

No Report On Their Finding
Yet Made by the
Experts.

Experts of the Ohio Well Drilling Company from Massillon, Ohio, who have been engaged by the public utilities commission to sink test wells throughout the city in search of a probable source of drinking water, have already sunk two test wells and are busily engaged on a third.

One test well was sunk on the Pipe Line road, while the other was located in London West. The well now being drilled is in the Broughdale place. After drilling the well in various parts of the city, which will be paid for by the city, the experts will advise the commission where to sink larger wells.

Accompanying this advice will come a definite guarantee that the wells yield the Ohio firm being given the contract for the big wells. If the wells do not live up to the guarantee, no payment will be made for the drilling, or if accepted by the city, payment will be made for only that much water is yielded.

The experts are forbidden by their employers to give out any details of results obtained by drilling the test wells, and because of this fact no information regarding the success or failure of the two wells already sunk is available to the citizens or public utilities commission.

CLOSING OF PARK TO MOTOR TRAFFIC TO BE DISCUSSED

Closing of Victoria Park to vehicular traffic, as recommended by the city council recently will likely prove the main item of business at the regular meeting of the public utilities commission this afternoon. While the majority of the commissioners are understood to be opposed to this move, it is intimated that they will concur with the city fathers, and that a traffic bylaw governing the barring of vehicles in the park will be drafted following official action this afternoon.

Other business to be discussed includes several reports of water consumption of the city relative to leaks in pipes and their homes.

HAS PERFECTED AN INEXPENSIVE X-RAY MACHINE

Jan Klaassens, Western U.
Technician, Gave Demonstration Today.

APPARATUS IS COMPACT
Roentgen Ray Device Will
Make X-Ray Available to
All Practitioners.

Claiming that his invention of a compact Roentgen Ray apparatus, costing approximately \$100, which can be operated by an ordinary house electric circuit, will revolutionize the medical profession, by placing an X-ray outfit within easy access of all practitioners, Jan Klaassens, technician in the department of biology at Western University, is demonstrating his perfected machine to interested experts at the "U" Annex, St. James street.

Klaassens is a native of Holland, who has been employed in biological work at the University of Leyden, and later entered the employ of the Dutch Government at the University of Amsterdam. Here as technician in the laboratory of roentgenology and electrotherapy for 14 years he engaged in research, perfecting his new apparatus.

Perfected Outfit Here.
Finally upon coming to Canada he continued his research work, with the result that, according to word received above has been his reward in London. Practically shorn of technical terms, what he has accomplished, Klaassens today issued a statement defining the field of his research with success achieved.

Following is the statement in full: The familiar X-ray, which has meant so much to biological science in general, and to medical science in particular, was first made known by the investigations of Roentgen in 1895. Since that time much progress has been made in perfecting tools for the practical application of his discovery, but little attention has been given to the developing of a universal high-frequency outfit to sell at a price within the reach of the general practitioner.

During the investigations of Roentgen he was employed on biological work at the University of Leyden, and was at once interested in his published report of the X-ray. He made a Roentgen outfit for himself, and shortly produced a crude apparatus which needed 20 minutes to make the picture now taken in one-tenth of a second. On leaving Leyden I entered the employ of the Dutch Government in the University of Amsterdam as technician in the laboratory for Roentgenology and electrotherapy. I remained in that position for several years, and enjoyed considerable opportunity for independent research. My efforts were directed towards the development of an improved high-frequency outfit for X-ray work, designed to be readily portable, and as handy as a flashlight.

The value of an outfit small enough to be carried anywhere in the hand and yet efficient enough to give results comparable to the most expensive apparatus, was my aim. It has to be a simple device, and one that can be operated by a current of 110 volts, direct or alternating current. It must operate on the ordinary house circuit, and it must be so simple that it can be operated by a person with no special training.

It is now noticed that these points apply to the plant generating the high-frequency current. This is the current which is used in the X-ray machine. The value of an outfit small enough to be carried anywhere in the hand and yet efficient enough to give results comparable to the most expensive apparatus, was my aim. It has to be a simple device, and one that can be operated by a current of 110 volts, direct or alternating current. It must operate on the ordinary house circuit, and it must be so simple that it can be operated by a person with no special training.

While employed at the University of Toronto in the department of physiology, I was given the privilege of using my spare time, and was almost completed when I came to London. Since then I have brought to the point where what is being demonstrated. "The tool is ten inches square and five inches in height. It produces a ten-inch spark on an amperage of current, giving, according to Dr. Deane's measurement, 200,000 volts to the inch. It will take any picture in a few seconds.

Costs Only \$100.
"On account of its fundamental simplicity and small size, the cost of manufacture is very low. The cost of the tools now in use. They cost from \$2,000 to \$5,000, while the demonstrated tool should cost in the neighborhood of \$100. Furthermore, tools of higher amperage, built on the same principle, will give a correspondingly greater spark, delivering for the usual 30-40 ampere a spark of several yards.

Briefly re-stated: This tool is economical to manufacture, operates on both direct and alternating current and on ordinary house voltage, delivers a ten-inch spark, and may be used not only for X-ray work, but for any kind of electrotherapy. Thus the advantages of electrotherapy will be placed at the disposal of all practitioners and patients could be dealt with wherever a lighting socket could be reached.

SIGNS TO BE PLACED OVER LARGE AREA TO NORTH OF LONDON

Ontario Motor League Providing Facilities For Tourists.

More than 100 square miles of country lying northward from this city to Georgian Bay and westward to Lake Huron, hitherto practically unexplored as far as the Ontario Motor League is concerned, is to be immediately logged, mapped, and placarded, according to Daniel Davis of Toronto, official sign-hanger of the league, who was in this city today.

Mr. Davis left this morning for Owen Sound, via Mitchell, Listowel, Harriston and Mount Forest, to inspect and prepare the first official log of the roadways in that section of the country.

The Ontario Motor League is undertaking the work as the direct result of a request made by the London Motor Club. Up to the present time motorists were forced to depend entirely upon their own sagacity to find their way about the northern counties of the western peninsula. Nowhere are there any signs, and the maps of the roads are incomplete. As the traffic towards Lake Huron and Georgian Bay has been steadily increasing, the Ontario Motor League was asked recently to placard the various roads.

Mr. Davis will first prepare a log of the country and thereby find how many miles will be required. As soon as the requisition has been filled the signs will be placed at different cross-roads, after the fashion followed in Western Ontario. More than 4,500 signs of various kinds have been posted by Mr. Davis during the past year throughout Ontario. This number does not include those placed by local clubs, which are affiliated with the Ontario Motor League.

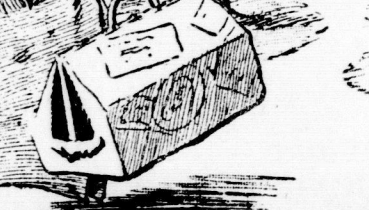

CLAIM TO MILLIONS RESTS ON PROMISE

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—A promise by Mrs. Beatrice Provost Nugent of West End avenue, that she would share the estate of her uncle, William E. Smith of the Hotel Biltmore (Mrs. Smith's son and Mrs. Nugent's uncle), was described in papers filed in the alleged considerations for an agreement by Smith to share equally with his niece an estate of almost \$100,000. This wealth was left to Smith under the terms of the will of his mother, widow of William Van Rensselaer Smith, a member of the firm Arkbelle Brothers, who died in her eighty-eighth year on August 6, Smith is 61.

Promised Fortune.
Mrs. Nugent, in the complaint filed yesterday by her attorney, Henry M. T. Beckman, 111 Broadway, maintains that it was the original wish of her grandfather that she should share generously in his estate. She has said that Mrs. Nugent did not know what provisions had been made for her in the will when on August 2 last she agreed not to tell her grandmother of her uncle's marriage to Clara Staley Smith. Mrs. Smith is her husband's junior by about twenty years.

Made Assignment.
It was further alleged that Smith had made an assignment of annuities and mortgages valued at \$250,000 to his bride, who was seeking to withdraw them from their repositories. An application for a temporary injunction, restraining both from this plan, and prohibiting Mrs. Smith from pressing a suit of replevin in the city court against the American Trust Company, was made last Saturday before Supreme Court Justice Isidore Wasenogle. The order was returnable Wednesday when the papers for Mrs. Nugent were filed and the case adjourned until next Friday.

Questions Wedding.
The papers throw no light on the identity of Mrs. William E. Smith, other than that she was married to Mrs. Nugent's uncle on June 19 last, that Mrs. Roxy Maria Smith never knew of the wedding, and that the latter did not welcome Mrs. William E. Smith at times when the latter visited her before the marriage.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith are now living in the Hotel Biltmore, where Mrs. Smith referred all questions to I. T. Flatto, attorney, at 261 Broadway. Mr. Flatto said that the allegations with reference to Mrs. Smith were unfounded. He asserted that there was no secrecy about her marriage to Mr. Smith, and that the mother of Mr. Smith knew all about the wedding, because Mrs. Roxy Maria Smith made the plans herself.

The other reason that Mr. Smith's mother didn't attend the wedding was because she was ill, and her illness eventually resulted in her death," explained Mr. Flatto. "We intend to disprove the allegation that the match was one that was objectionable to the mother of Mr. Smith. We intend to produce the affidavits of five witnesses, showing that Mrs. Roxy Maria Smith knew all about the wedding and made the plans for it."
