Oracle Club Debate Brings Out Varied Opinions on Occupation.

SAYS ONLY MEANS

By a majority of three, the Oracle Club last night voted that France was justified in her occupation of the Ruhr. The debate, which called for the best efforts on the part of the principals, was judged entirely on the merits of the speakers, rather than

the issue involved. Major Kippen, leader of the affirmative, appealed for French sympathy on the ground that Germany had demonstrated by evasion of practically all provisions of the Treaty of Versailles that she could not be trusted Effective propaganda had in some measure convinced the world that Germany was incapable of reconstructing herself owing to the harsh demands of France. The speaker said these demands are justified, and that France was employing the only efficacious means of making Germany pay her bill.

Sees Another War.

The strongest argument of the evening was that submitted by Major Albert Murphy for the negative. He showed how the Imperialistic attitude of France constituted the gravest menace with which Europe had to deal since the disintegration of Germany. Germany, he said, was bankrupt, and the French occupation was

"All Europe, with the possible exception of Italy, which preserves an attitude of tacit consent, is opposed to the demonstration of French militarism as shown by the Ruhr occupation," Major Murphy said. "If there were the slightest possibility of collecting a proportion of the reparations from Germany. France has dissipated it. She is now the premier military country of the world."
