Chicago, March 30.—Many of the contractors of the World's Fair grounds are looking forward with a great deal of uncasiness to next Monday. An edict has gone out from the labor organizations that after that day only union workmen will be employed on World's Fair jobs, and contractors who do not pay attention to this order will suffer a strike. The movement applies particularly to carpenters. Their union is weak compared with the bricklayers' and some others, and there being but thirty days left in which to finish the hundreds of exhibit pavilions and concessionaries' stands, and not nearly enough carpenters to supply the demand, they think it is a good chance to strengthen the union. In case of a strike many of the buildings cannot be finished, and about the only thing left for the contractors to do seems to be to get their men into the union.


