CHICAGO LEFT IN SHADE

Convention Today Will Take Up Platform and Nomination.

Denver, July 8.—The Democratic National convention is marking time so far as the nomination of candidates and the completion of a platform are concerned.

The platform is still in an incomplete condition, and will not be presented until tomorrow.

The early meeting of the convention today was a session of little practical progress.
