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UNFORTUNATE. Further Destruction of Lives and Property by Cyclones.

FORT DODGE, Iowa, June 24.—A train despatcher struck at Emmetsburg, the county seat of Polk county, was blown to pieces this morning by a cyclone, and over one hundred people killed.

The Illinois Central and Chicago and North-Western were blown from the track. The Milwaukee and St. Louis road was wrecked. There was a washout in North West city, and it is reported that three or four more towns in that locality are blown to pieces. The wires are all down.

ST. LOUIS, Iowa, June 25.—A heavy storm with rain passed over Northern Iowa Friday night. Much damage to property is reported, but no loss of life.

At Emmetsburg a number of buildings were blown from their foundations and there was some damage to crops from hail. At Hospers the Catholic church, the depot and the schoolhouse, and a number of other buildings were wrecked. Eighteen freight cars were derailed. The storm struck the railroad early morning scattering lumber piles and demolishing a partly enclosed house. At Emmetsburg the farm house and other buildings were damaged. Several persons were injured.
