SAD TO BE A CONSPIRACY.

HOW A DEAD MAN'S FAMILY GOT \$5000 FOR \$23.15.

The Northwestern Masonic Aid Association is an insurance company which takes risks on the lives of members of the craft who can pass the necessary medical examination. The amount of each risk is limited to \$5000. Mr. J. A. Stoddard is the secretary of the association and its headquarters are at Chicago. The officers of the association are at the present time recently deceased on the claim which was settled a few months ago in Toronto and which they allege was brought about by conspiracy on the part of several Toronto parties, among them being members of the Masonic craft. So worked up were these officials that it is said they put a considerable bribe on the trail and he was unable to obtain the evidence. The charge is that: Last July an advertising agent died in Toronto of cancer of the stomach, from which it is alleged he suffered for a couple of years. Two months before he died he was accepted as a risk in the association and his executors, the Toronto General Trust Company, were paid \$5000. The amount that he paid to the association was \$23.15. The association, after paying the money to the executors, was notified by one of its members in Toronto that the risk in question was a counterfeit and was to be withdrawn from it. It was stated that the association must have been aware of this fact.

BOTH SHERIFF AND PRISONER DIE.

Dead Before Hamilton Lancers is Lunched at and Eternity Sheriff Webb Expires Suddenly from Excitement.

Stamerson, Ont. Dec. 19.—(Special Correspondent.) The murderer of Napoleon Math, his brother-in-law, was hanged in the yard of the Sherbrooke jail at 11 P.M. this morning. This morning's tragedy was a double one, for it involved the death of Sheriff Webb as well. At 8 1/2 o'clock the sheriff arrived at the jail, and was admitted to Sheriff Webb's private apartment. Ten minutes after he had completed his toilet he was seated in a chair and was talking to a man who had just arrived at the jail. Webb was dead before he had time to utter a word. Death was due to acute heart failure, induced by excitement. It was a gloomy crowd that filed into the jail to witness the execution. The incident inspired the sympathy that was felt for the murderer. Last night at 10 o'clock the sheriff's private apartment was visited by his spiritual advisers, Messrs. J. C. H. Tupper and J. C. H. THE WHARF COLLAPSED.

And Seven Men Were Carried Down to Death—Briquet Accident at Hall.

HALIFAX, Dec. 19.—Seven men were drowned at 10 o'clock to-night by the collapse of a wharf upon which 3000 tons of coal were being stored. The cargo of the steamer Oakden, chartered by the Canada Coal Co., was being discharged on their south wharf. The wharf was being roofed in and it was intended to store the coal there all winter. The work of discharging was carried on all night and day. Fully half the cargo had been placed on the wharf, when at 10 o'clock the roof of the structure under the centre of the wharf collapsed. The men were at work on the roof wheeling and trimming at the moment of collapse. Without the slightest warning the spiles and flooring gave way and the centre of the roof fell. The men at work were buried with the falling coal. One man named Anderson was killed in jumping into a solid portion. These were the names of the men who were killed: NICHOLAS BALDWIN, an old man with a large family; CONNELL HAYES, married; HEVENS WHELAN, single; JOHN KELLY, married; JOHN BROWN, married; JOHN DUNN, married; JOHN SMITH, married; JOHN WILSON, married.
