present time there are thirteen ordained clergymen, twelve of whom are themselves deaf, ministering to the spiritual needs of 35.000 deaf mutes in the United States of whom there are fully 20,000 in the southern section. The salaries of the missionaries to the deaf range from \$1,000 to \$1,800 annually, and a very few of them have their expenses, in addition, provided.
