

in regard to the list of Birds met with in
the Winter season, in the vicinity of Elgin-
brook, - by Mr. D. Marshall, and refe-
red to by Mr. Lee-Macneile, and published
in volume 2 of "The Canadian
Naturalist," we find, the Black-capped,
Horned Owl, Snaggy Owl, Barred Owl,
Brown Creeper, Chickadee, Robin, Sing-
ing Thrush, Tawny, Redpoll, Pine Grosbeak,
Pine Grosbeak, Crossbill, Blue Jay, Northern
Siskin, Northern Flicker, White Breasted
Finch, Gurney Woodpecker, and Ruf-
ous-tailed Flycatcher; 18 species; and he also
mentions the report that a Goshawk, a Gold-
finch, and a Horned Owl, had been seen.
In this article Mr. D'Urban adds the
rests of the paper by Mr. Allan on the
birds seen during at Toronto, and pub-
lished in the "Canadian Naturalist"
March 1853 (five years before) as re-
ading 24 species, with the following
among 12 species were not observed by him
at Elgin-brook, - Bald Eagle, Pigeon Hawk,
Great Horned Owl, Gold Finch, Tree
Sparrow, Red-Crossed Billed, Canada Jay,
Red-Bellied Tit-tit, Hairy Wood-
pecker, Thrush and ~~Short-tail~~ Grackle
while the Brown Creeper, and the Horned
Owl are not mentioned by Mr. Allan.
