### SUNDAY STREET CARS

THE new Council have decided by large majority to submit the question of Sunday street cars to the popular chance of the proposal being carried.

However it is not the first time that honest and well meaning, but short-sighted wage-earners have unwit tingly been made the dupes and tools of the moneyed interests and we suppose it won't be the last.

The proposal to run the street cars on Sanday in its present shape must be voted down. It is a dangerous and inous attempt to deprive the worker of his day of rest. As we have repeat edly pointed out should such a measure pass there is no sort of guarantee that the road will not immediately after wards be let to Frank Smith or some other equally brutal and merciless capitalist without conditions as to hou or wages.
