Death of the Archbishop of Montreal

MONTREAL. Dec. 31.—The demise of the beloved Archbishop of Montreal, Mgr. E-louard Charles Fabre, had it occurred any day during the past mouth would not have been unexpected. The shadow of death had rested the anignously palace gines the ed. The snadow of death had rested over the opiscopal palace since the return of Mgr. Fabra from Paris on November 23rd with the fatal illness upon him which had intercepted him on upon him which had intercepted him on the way to Rome and prevented his contemplated visit to the Holy Father. When the fact was made known this morning that the end had come the sorrow and sympathy not only of Montreal, not only of Canada, but in truth it may be said of Oatholic Ohristendom was made manifest. The dissolution of the venerable archibelon was most impressive and peacebishop was most impressive and peace ful. At the bedside was the Bisho

(His Grace's spiritual adviser), and a number of priests of the diocese, all personal friends of the diocese, all personal friends of the diocese, all personal friends of the diony grelate. It had been known since the early morning that the end of the long illness, endured with such simple Christian heroism, could be but a matter of hours, and all the afternoon there had been frequent attacks of syncope. One of these attacks occurring at six minutes to 11 o'dock pm. was the immediate cause of death. Father Filiatrault whispered the last words of parting: "The time has now arrived when you must make your body a sacrifice unto the Lord, The response came distinctly: "I have made my body a sacrifice unto the Lord every minute."

The sad news was made public at once; but not until the morning were formal messages sent to Rome, to the Bishops of Canada and the United States and to the brother of the deceased prelate in Paris, Mr. Heetor Fabre, Canadian agent in France. In the forenoon messages of aympathy began to arrive from all parts of two continents. Among the first oitizens of Montreal to express their sorrow were: Bishop Bond (Anglican), Dean Carmicheal and other prominent Protestant clergymen.

An account of the last illness of Mgr. Fabre need not be written at length. Three months ago he set out for the Eternal City on an official visit. He had proceeded as far as Paris upon his journey where he was taken ill and where he was

This letter decided his future state of life. On the seventh of September, 1844 he assumed the caseock at Chatenry, and on Oxtober 18th, he entered the Sulpician Seminary at Issy, where he had, as colleagues men who afterwards became among the most distinguished members of the French episcopacy, among them being Mgr. de la Tour d'Auvarnge, Archishop of Bourges, tie late Cradinal Lavigerie, Archishop of Algiers, Mgr. In 1846 the young ecclesiastic visited Rome, and had the honor of an audience with Gregory XVI—in after life he had the same honor conferred on him on several occasions by two other Popose—Pius IX and Leo XIII. Shortly after he returned to Montreal, and became attached to the Bishop's Palseo.

In 1852 he was moved to Pointe Olisre, but in a short time he was recalled to the Bishop's Palace by the late Bishop Bourget. Oanon Fabre, as he had then become, was esteemed by all classes of society. In 1860 he visited Rome, at the time of the Ecumenical Council, with Mgr. Bourget. In April 1873 it became known that Canon Fabre had been appointed titular Bishop of Gratianopolis and Coadjutor Bishop of Gratianopolis and Coadjutor Bishop of Gratianopolis and Coadjutor Bishop of Montreal, cumfutura succession. Despierres, also of the same place, both ordained at the Foreign Missions: Mgr. Lauge, win, Archbishop of St. Boniface, and Mgr. E. J. O'Des, Bishop of Nesqually, Washington State. In addition to the above His Grace consecrated the following bishop and archbishops Mgr. Lorrain, Vicar Apostolic of Pontise; Mgr.
