factifices to our gods and fore-fathers, fometimes of flaves (which cuffom I have much broke), fometimes of horfes, other, times of oxen, and other creatures.

I very often belides love to go abroad about eight or ten miles an end, in what is call'd by the Portuguele = fuperentine; not but that I have many fine chaires, but do not like to truft to my people's carrying them, not being fo much used to them as the other. When I am out I fix myfelf under fome great shadey tree; whate I view what number of armed people 1 have ready in two or three hours : by this time up comes two or three hundred of my inferior wifes, the chief favourites being about my perfen in fundry flations, fome to fan and cool me, others to keep the flies away with whilks, others holding my armes, as gun, pifiols, and fabre, &c. others again holding kedyfalls or humbrellows, which fland on the ground and make a canopey over my chaire, and another to fill and light my pipe, r which being done, I order the atoretaid hands of women to he unloaded, who have each a cafe of brandy, though cloathed in crimfon, green, blue, and black velvett, and fine filks, and arrayed with great quantities of large corall (for my flaves buy me things of all nation.). Befices, I have many fine things which comes over land, by a people which are called Mallays, and are in comeing fome months; thate religion are Mahometans (and tells me that near the fea, on the other fide, are a fort of white man); I have many of these people in my country, and follow thare feveral occupations as well as grading, in which I give them great encouragement (as I do all strargers). I shave appointed a governor or petty king of their owne over them ; thele ware the people who fome of them used to go down to Widah and Jacquin, and come back and give us an account of the firanger manner of ships and white man coming to trade thare, which we long found to be true by thare gunns, powder, and all forts of goods being brought from market to market.

But to return :--When I have fnioked my pipe, and my people have pretty well exercifed themfelves in activity of bedy, by running, leaping, and firing thate arms, as if engaged, 1 order my brandy to be diftributed, which is foone made away with, and then the fun being pretty well gon, 1 return home with the acclamations of my people, with my drums beating, and hornes of different fortes founding, with other fortes of my country mufick, in wich 1 have great numbers day and night centinually imployed about my houle.

So once more hopeing Your Majeffy the company or other trading fubjects will not fail to fend me back this white main, who is now to me as much as my fon, whom I defign fhall fucceed me, and wheever comes with him thall not want encouragement j neither thall any fhip that comes by his means, and to him, puy any tribute or cuflems to me, as they did to the king of Ardah, for hysperialatter his arrival att Jacquin or Dawloniay.

He can informe you more all large of my wars, conqueits, greatness; and grandure, though a black ; fo fhall take leave, and hope your God will always protper your wars and undertakeings, and committe the faid white man to his and your case, for Ifhall not faile (as I have already done) to offer facrifices to mine continually for his prefervation and fatereturn, with affurances to them that on it I will give for that purpole oxen, hoggs, theep, and goats, and fhall be more rejeleed art it, then art the greated battle or conqueft I ever won; fo I remain, with the most profound refpect, as the Gods have made us blacks to ferve you.
