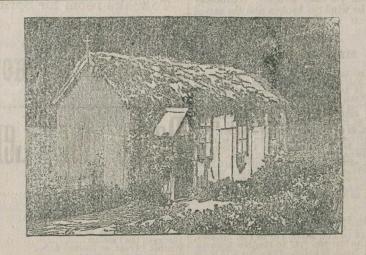

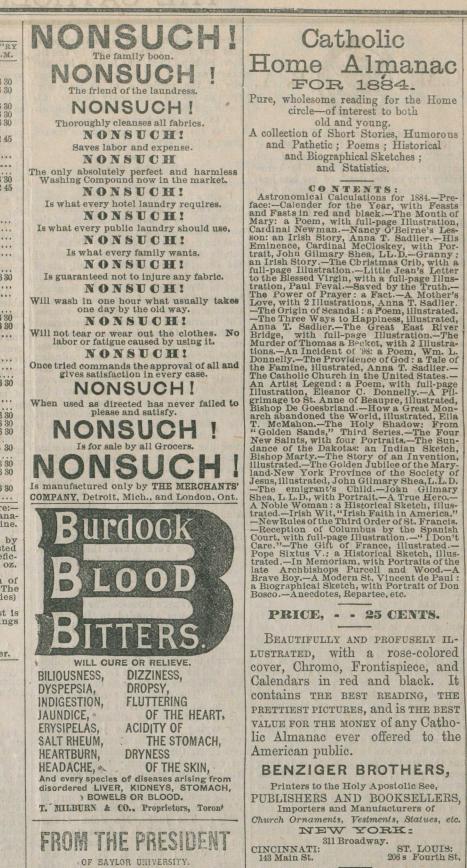
Crushed by the Cars.
