DAMAGES TO SAINT-BONAVENTURE BY TORNADO—REQUEST FOR FEDERAL AID—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Yvon Pinard (Drummond): Mr. Speaker, pursuant to the terms of Standing Order 43, I request unanimous consent of the House to discuss an important and urgent matter.

In view of the tragedy that occurred yesterday at Saint-Bonaventure, in the riding of Drummond, when a tornado caused the death of at least three persons, some fifteen others being still unaccounted for, and over a million dollars' worth of damages by destroying a large number of houses, businesses and various municipal buildings, and as the provincial authorities are said to have been asked to declare the area a disaster area, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Saint-Hyacinthe (Mr. Wagner):

That the federal government immediately offer all available assistance to the victims of Saint-Bonaventure and assure them of the co-operation of all departments concerned.

Mr. Speaker: Order. The House has heard the motion of the hon. member. Under Standing Order 43, the motion requires unanimous consent of the House. Is there unanimous consent?

Some hon. Members: Yes.

MESSAGE OF CONGRATULATION TO NATIVES ON ONE HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY OF SIGNING OF LAKE WINNIPEG TREATY No. 5—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Cecil Smith (Churchill): Mr. Speaker, I rise under the provisions of Standing Order 43 on a matter of urgent and pressing importance. This is the same motion I proposed yesterday and I again seek Your Honour's permission to present it. Inasmuch as articles of a treaty, known as The Lake Winnipeg Treaty No. 5, were made and concluded at Berens River and Norway House in 1875 on September 20 and 24 respectively between Her Majesty the Queen and the Saulteaux and Swampy Cree Tribes of Indians, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Parry Sound-Muskoka (Mr. Darling):

That congratulatory messages be sent from this House to those bands of Treaty Indians adhering to the provisions of the said treaty and who, early in August, will be celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of The Lake Winnipeg Treaty No. 5.
