OPENING OF THE SESSION

Madam Speaker read a communication from the Governor General's Secretary announcing that His Excellency the Governor General of Canada would proceed to the Senate chamber at eleven o'clock on this day for the purpose of formally opening the session of the Dominion Parliament.

A message was delivered by Colonel T. G. Bowie, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, as follows:

Mr. Speaker, it is the pleasure of His Excellency the Governor General of Canada that this honourable House attend him immediately in the chamber of the honourable the Senate.

Accordingly, Madam Speaker with the House went up to the Senate chamber. Then the Hon. Jeanne Sauvé, Speaker of the House of Commons, said:

May it please Your Excellency,

The House of Commons have elected me their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If in the performance of those duties I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me, and not to the Commons, whose servant I am, and who, through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to Your Excellency's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Excellency the most favourable construction.

The Honourable the Speaker of the Senate, addressing the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons, then said:
