have in the Northern United States either 8-4, 6-6 or 6-3-3, and there is much to be said for this 6-6 plan rather than the 6-3-3 plan in a system such as ours.

You have another thing to solve there, that is, what are you going to do with the 12th grade, the standard you will reach, whether you will have the twelfth grade equal to the 13th grade of the Pennsylvania, New York and other school systems, or whether you will keep that as it is now.
