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JUPITER will be the Evening Star until February 3; after which it will be the Morning Star until August 22. It will then be the Evening Star to the end of the year.

SATURN will be the Evening Star until June 10; after which it will be the Morning Star until Dec. 18. It will then be the Evening Star.
