could be made in either Toronto or Quebec.

But, above all, Canadians must bear in mind that the agitators of this province and the agitators of Ontario, the men who are trying to make reputations and gain popularity, finding fault and piffling over little things, omitting the greater issues, do not represent the views of the large majority of the French or English-Canadians.

Let the politician who would separate the two races for the profit of his party be branded with pro-German views, and let not the true Canadian patriot forget that at this stage of the war crisis we must stand united for a common cause, not only against militarism and barbarism, but those who retard recruiting by piffling over statistics of how many British and foreign or English and French-Canadians have gone to the front. Let us only think that the casualty lists include all Canadians, no matter where they come from, and greater will be the
