BIG WAR IGNORED BY PEACE CONGRESS

Belligerents Will Be Asked to Send Delegates-Militarism Denounced.

Canadian Press Despatch. WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. - All nations, including the warring powers of Europe, will be invited to participate in the biennial peace congress of the American Peace Society. The direc-tors of the society, meeting here today, determined after considerable discus sion to proceed with its plans for the congress and to extend the invitation to send delegates to the countries of the world without reference to the great war now in progress. A resolution offered by Representa-tive Slayden of Texas, and unani-mously adopted by the board, deneunced agitation in favor of strength ening the military and naval estab lishments of the United States, declaring that "America cannot advance the cause of humanity by carrying the lamp of peace in one hand and a steadily rising and advancing sword in the other."
