improper in his official capacity, and was on that ground (if I recollect rightly) suspended. I believe the order to suspend or remove him came from England. The Judge was a much more formidable enemy to the public tranquillity than the poor misguided Surveyor-General. He had, as it seemed, a prodigious longing for popularity, and appeared to be anything but scrupulous about the manner of acquiring it. His turbuence, I fear, was prompted by a worse motive than the mere gratification of his vanity. On his first circuit in the western part of the province, he began his charge o the Grand Jury at the opening of the Criminal Court hus :-- "Gentlemen! fifteen years of disgraceful admisistration of the government of this province calls oudly for redress." As those fifteen years embraced he whole period that Upper Canada had had a rovernment, the denunciation was sweeping enough, oming as it did from one who had been but a few nonths, or weeks in the country. If I do not forget it, will inclose another of the judge's charges to the rand Jury, which will show that modesty was certainly ot his forte. There was a third party, a barrister, who ad been some years out from Ireland, and who was lso very active in this seditious movement, but his areer was soon unhappily terminated. He was attendng the assizes at Niagara, in which the judge alluded was presiding, and took occasion in some trial that e was engaged in to help on the cause by some inammatory declamation against the government. arrister who was opposed to him remonstrated against his use being made of a court of justice, and appealed the judge to discountenance it.
