MYSTERY SURROUNDS DEATH OF PARENTS AND TWO CHILDREN

Scourge of Malignant Scarlet Fever Devastates Household of Angus McKay, Near Huntsville, Following Funeral of Daughter, Who Died of Unknown Disease in Toronto Hospital.

HUNTSVILLE, March 8.—(Special).—Angus McKay, his wife and two children are dead as a result of malignant scarlet fever, and two other children are seriously ill at their home in Dorset, about 20 miles east of here. The surviving children are being attended by Dr. McGibbon of Bracebridge.

There is talk of an investigation here, arising from the fact that a few weeks ago the body of the eldest daughter was brought from Toronto, where she had died in the Western Hospital. Following the opening of the casket at the home, the outbreak occurred, it is said.

A nurse has been sent from the hospital to attend the McKay patients.

MOTOR BUS LINE FOR ROSEDALE RESIDENTS

Works Committee Favors the Scheme and Recommends it to Council—Eastern People Want Overhead Bridge on Woodbine Avenue—Deaths From Pneumonia Average Four a Day.

The proposed bus line for the benefit of the northern section of Rosedale came up yesterday afternoon before the works committee, and after a lengthy debate the scheme was recommended and sent on to council.

Ald. Dunn claimed that the route were suitable for a bus line in that section, and he agreed with the city engineer that Rosedale would be better served in this way than by electric lines. He claimed that if such a service were established it would soon become so popular that the idea would be taken up in all parts of the city. He thought that if the matter were submitted to the people they would willingly vote one million dollars to establish such a service for all the outlying parts of the city. Some of the aldermen thought that the scheme should be tried out on some of the poorer sections of the city first, but their objections were overruled.

A number of representatives from St. Michael College were again on hand to protest against the plans being adopted, claiming that the plans be adopted so that Chapel street and Vincent street should be connected at a slight angle, thereby damaging the College property to the extent of 33 feet. It was decided to hold the matter in abeyance until the college could submit a proper proposition, and in the meantime the city engineer will report upon the proposal.

Overhead Bridge.
George Newton, representing the ratepayers on Woodbine avenue, asked the committee to recommend an overhead bridge over the G.T.R. tracks, Woodbine avenue, north of Daguerre street. The city engineer was asked to make a report upon the scheme.

Railway Siding.
A. G. Rogers, representing the committee to consent to a railway siding across Gerrard street, just east of Osborne avenue, in order that his coal and wood yard might be served. The committee decided to recommend the scheme.

It was decided that the committee should look over the situation regarding Home Smith's radial proposition, so the members will take a trip to the Home's next Tuesday.

Dr. Hastings stated yesterday that the deaths from pneumonia for the past few weeks had averaged four a day in Toronto, and he attributed this high mortality to the long spell of cold weather. Already this month thirty deaths have resulted from pneumonia, and of this number 14 were babies. The medical health officer says that this disease is largely the result of ill-heated houses and poor ventilation.
