A. P. GILLIES IS ARRESTED

Promoter Well Known in Toronto Held at Seattle on a Serious Charge.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 15.—(Special.)—On a warrant charging a serious offence, A. P. Gillies, well known in Toronto, a promoter with a number of million dollar schemes that have kept the City of Tacoma, this state, on the edge of bankruptcy for a year, was arrested this afternoon and held in \$100,000 bonds.

Gillies is the promoter for the Lewis and Clarke Sisel Company, which, he announced, was preparing to invest a huge sum in a steel plant on the outskirts of Tacoma.

Gillies represents that he is heavily backed by capitalists in New York and London, and letters in his possession indicate that he is in communication with big men in the financial world.

Less Liquor Distilled, But Inland Revenue Makes Record

Distilleries and Breweries Yield Great Bulk of \$19,635,000, Receipts Showing Increase of \$2,393,000 Over Last Year—Canada Consumes About 47,000,000 Gallons of Malt Liquor Yearly.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—(Can. Press.)—The quantity of spirits produced in Canada during the fiscal year 1912, was 4,784,296 proof gallons, nearly half a million gallons less than the production of 1911.

Tobacco Consumption Grows. The total weight of raw leaf tobacco used by the manufacturers of Canada in the fiscal year 1912, was 31,379,856 pounds, an increase of two million pounds over the previous year.

Production of Malt Liquor. The number of gallons of malt liquor manufactured in Canada during the fiscal year 1912, was 47,518,447, which may be taken as a year's consumption in this country of ale, beer and porter, as very little is exported.

RISH TROUBLE CAUSED BY CHURCH

Rev. Dr. Speer Says All the Turmoil is Due to the Activities of Catholicism, and the Ancient Order of Hibernians—Home Rule No Solution.

That the political turmoil, the poverty and the religious animosity in Ireland were all due to the operations of the Roman Catholic Church and to the activities of the Ancient Order of Hibernians were the conclusions voiced by Rev. Dr. J. C. Speer in his sermon at High Park Avenue Methodist Church last night.

His Own Impressions. Dr. Speer made an extensive tour of Ireland on his recent visit to Europe and he gave his own impressions of the Irish question.

Political One. "They claim they want to govern Ireland well, but the testimony is that they want to separate the country from England," he said.
