He also has plans for the promotion of a company for building a twenty-four storey sky-eraper in Tacoma and several other schemes, some of which have been dis-

cussed by the municipal commission.

Gilles represents that he is heavily backed by capitalists in New York and London, and letters in his possession indicate that he is in communication with big men in the financial world. His different schemes interested several Tacoma capitalists, one of whom a short time ago declared the city should take Gilles earne to public notice in Toronto with plans for that city that received much newspaper notice, according to a mass of clippings in his possession.
