London, Dec. 6.—Many surprises in re-  
sults are recorded in British soccer  
games decided today. In the first divi-  
sion, Burnley went down at Oldham and  
lost their position at the top of the table  
to West Bromwich Albion, who scored a  
surprising win over Manchester City by  
3 to 2. Sixty thousand people turned  
out at Highbury to see a local Derby be-  
tween the green London rivals—the  
Arsenal and Chelsea—which resulted in  
draw 1 to 1. Aston Villa continued  
their run of successes and beating the  
strong Manchester United team by 2 to 0.
