Contamination of the water supply of the city and of East Toronto is feared by the provincial board of ealth from the new plan to straighten the River Don, whose waters, carrying a large amount of sewage, are to be discharged directly into Lake Ontario thru the proposed channel. Hitherto this stream has flowed into the bay, but the intention is to cut thru the bar enclosing Ashbridge's Bay and close the channel into Toronto Bay. The result, according to the board of health, when the outflow is directly into the lake, will be to endanger the purity of the water south of Balmy Beach, where the East Toronto intake is situated, and at the city intake. The Health Act requires the submis-sion of the plans for every common sewer or other sewage project to the board of health. The board, in this instance, owing to the importance of the matter, has instructed the secre-tary De Hedgetts to communicate the matter, has instructed the secre-tary, Dr. Hodgetts to communicate with the city authorities, and to obtain particulars of what is purposed. As a heavy penalty is provided for any vio-lations of the regulations, or such as would cause a menace to the public health, it was thought to be more considerate to take this course. It is probable that a conference of the city officials and those of the board will result.
