The Galatea, it appears from the report of her second officer, was abandoned on Feb. her second officer, was abandoned on Feb. 15, at which time she was in a sinking condition. The barque had experienced terrible weather, and began to leak rapidly. In spite of the fact that her pumps were kept going, the Galatea made 10 inches of water, and at 9 o'clock on the morning of Feb. 15 Captain Lewis, the chief officer, the steward, the stewardess and three seamen left her in the only remaining boat, the others having been stove in during the gale. At the end of four hours the boat was lost sight of in a furious gale, and the second officer considered it impossible for her to have weathered the storm.

The Unfortunates.

The Unfortunates. At 9 o'clock the same evening the Garton hove in sight, and took off the remainder of the crew of the Galatea at a great risk. The high seas running prevented the boat launched by the Garton from approaching the sinking barque, so that the men on board the latter donned life jackets, and were hauled through the water, one of them having an arm broken while being rescued.

The Galatea's second officer also says that after her sails were blown away the commander ordered the boat to be launched, and that he was the first to embark in her. The chief officer followed him, and the steward was next. The stewardess and three members of the crew thereupon entered the boat. The stewardess in so doing fell into the sea, and was nearly drowned.

Captain Lewis, according to the second officer, took with him all the provisions, and left the remainder of the crew on board the sinking ship, although, he adds, there was room for all in the boat, which hung about the barque until 1.30 p.m., and then rowed on.


