Therefore be it "Resolved, first that we are unalter-ably opposed to all trusts and monopo-lies as in derogation of the common right.

Government Ownership Demanded.

"Second, that we demand of the sev-eral states and cities that they take such action as will lead to the public ownership of all public utilities, and we demand of the Federal and State Gov-

ermand of the Federal and State Gov-craments such legislation as will effect-ually control the railways and prevent extortion and discrimination. "Third, That we demand of Congress and the Legislatures of the several States that the yabolis all special privi-leges and take whatever action is re-guired to destroy monopoly.

A Law for Politicians. "Fourth, That in our judgment no can-didate for public office is entitled to the suffrages of his fellow citizens who does not earnestly declare his hostility to all combinations in restraint of trade, or the further granning of any special privileges, and openly avow his purpose to favor such legislation as will suppress them.

"Fifth, That it is the duty of the

"Fifth, That it is the duty of the people, by organized effort, to secare the nomination by the political parties of the opponents of trusts, and who have the integrity, courage and ability to defend the rights of the people against impending industrial shavery. "Sixth, That the growth of private industrial corporations under the general laws of the several States, and the ad-ventages given to such artificial per-sons by such laws, threaten the extinc-tion of all natural persons, as compeil-tors with them, in every line of busi-mess. "We therefore recommend that the everal States take immediate action to limit the purposes for which such cor-perations may be formed, and discour-age their future formation, by the adop-tion of such measures as their wisdom may advise."
