Death of Hon. William B. Ives, M.P.

for Sherbrooke, Que. [Special to The Advertiser per C. P. R.] Ottawa, July 15.-Hon. W. B. Ives died at St. Luke's Hospital at 11:40 a.m. today, from paralysis.

Following closely on the lamentable death of the late Senator Sanford, the Conservative party suffers a severe loss in the demise of another able and emi-nent leader. Hon. William Bullock Ives was born in Compton, Que., Nov. 17, 1341. He was called to the bar in 1857, practiced for many years Sherbrooke, and was made a Q. C. by the Marquis of Lorne in 1880. Besides practicing his profession, the deceased was interested in a number of business enterprises. After serving as mayor of Sherbrooke, he was, in 1878, elected to the Dominion House of member fo Richmond and Wolfe, holding the sea till 1891, when he was returned f Sherbrooke, which city he represent at the time of his death. He was cal to the privy council in 1892, and appointed president of that body, h ing the position until the defeat of Conservative party in 1897, when retired with his leader, Sir Cha Tupper. He was president of Eastern Townships Conservative A. ciation. In 1869 he married Elizabet E., only daughter of the late Hon. J. H. Pope, minister of canals and railways under Sir John A. Macdonald.
