The total to be voted for public works is \$2,302,575, of which \$367,000 is for capital expenditure. Last year the total amount for this branch of the service was \$2,302,765. is \$141,400, as against \$160,780 last year, while the amount for other public works in the province is \$418,400, as against \$330,413 for the preceding year. 
> Getting Better Every Day-His Rides in Wheel-Chair and Carriage in the Bright Sunshine Through the Healthful Pinelands.

By the invalid's side, chatting or in silence, and following with her eyes the pointings of the knotted stick carried by the man in the chair, walks Mrs. Kipling, plainly showing in her face full content with her husband's present
