OF GOD'S GRACE**

**Evangelist Wharton Tells of a  
Free Gospel and an Un-  
changing Friend.**

Many persons who are interested in  
the success of the evangelistic services  
going on in Jubilee Rink fully ex-  
pected that the counter-attractions of  
the Victoria Day celebration would  
leave Evangelist Wharton with a very  
slim audience. It was therefore a glad  
surprise to see the largest attendance

**A Free Gospel.**  
After a short but inspiring song ser-  
vice, led by Dr. J. H. Lau, the large  
assemblage was asked to join in re-  
peating the Lord's Prayer, Rev. E. B.  
Lanceley leading the invocation. The  
old favorite hymn, "Am I a Soldier of  
the Cross," was sung with great fer-  
vor, and then Dr. Wharton read from  
Isaiah iv., beginning: "Oh, everyone  
that thirsteth, come ye to the waters,  
and he that hath no money; come ye,  
and buy wine and milk without money  
and without price."

"That is," said the evangelist, "who-  
ever wants salvation can get it free-  
ly."

"Incline your ear and come unto  
me; hear and your soul shall live." We  
don't know the proper  
value of a soul. Jesus has said that  
one soul is worth more than the whole  
world. "Incline your ear"—none are so  
deaf as those who won't hear. God  
help you and me to help people hear."

Here the speaker called on Dr. Lau  
for a solo, which was given in an im-  
pressive manner.

Before beginning his very brief ad-  
dress, Dr. Wharton expressed his great  
gratification at seeing such a large  
audience in spite of the attractions  
elsewhere.

**A Sweet Message.**  
"I have a message for you tonight  
that has often proved sweet to me,"  
said the evangelist, as he read for his  
text the words in Hebrews xiii., "Jesus  
Christ, the same yesterday, today and  
forever." It has often been asked  
"what is in a name." "There is a  
great deal in a name," said Dr. War-  
ton. "I asked a little girl what her  
name was, and her answer awakened a  
thousand sweet memories, for she men-  
tioned the name of my Mother-in-Law."  
There is nothing in anything but what  
our hearts put into it. I have a little  
piece of blue paper with four pins in it,  
and I wouldn't give it for all the pins  
in London, for that piece of paper and  
the pins were found in the pocket of  
the dress that my mother wore in her  
last days. Is there nothing in a name?  
Ask the Christian:

"How sweet the name of Jesus sounds  
In a believer's ear;  
It soothes his sorrows, heals his  
wounds,  
And drives away his fear."

"Jesus writes his name in our hearts  
as well as on the tablets of our mem-  
ory. The name 'Jesus' is given on our  
souls, and you must break our hearts  
to take it out. The other name,  
'Christ,' is the name of my Mother-in-  
Law, our Savior-King. Let us  
crown him Lord of all."

**An Unchanging Friend.**  
"Jesus Christ the same? How sweet  
to have an unchanging friend. You  
can hardly pay a higher compliment  
to a man than to say you always know  
where to find him. Jesus is the same  
in his person. Time does not tinge his  
hair with gray or write wrinkles on  
his brow. His eye is undimmed by  
years. He is ever the same. Jesus is  
the same in his plans. His plan of  
salvation is 'Believe on the Lord Jesus  
Christ, and thou shalt be saved.' That  
plan will never be changed. It needs  
no change.

"There is no change in his ability  
to carry out his promises. Among his  
many precious promises are these,"  
said the speaker:  
"Come unto me all ye that labor and  
are heavy laden, and I will give you  
rest."  
"Him that cometh unto me I will in  
no wise cast out."  
"I will never leave thee nor forsake  
thee."  
"Then," said the speaker he is un-  
changeable in his love. His love is  
greater than that of a mother, which  
is the strongest of all human affec-  
tion, and having 'loved his own,' as  
the Apostle John says, he 'loves them  
to the end.'"
