

2 ounces flour
1 ounce oleomargarine
1 teaspoonful baking powder
Milk, or milk and water to mix
Pass potatoes through wire sieve and
mix with flour and baking powder

Mash the potatoes and mix in the cheese. Put oleomargarine and milk into a saucepan and heat. Then mix thoroughly with the potatoes. Season with salt and pepper, and place large spoonfuls of the mixture in separate piles like drop-cakes on a greased tin. Bake in a quick oven ten to fifteen minutes, or till they are a golden color. These potato recipes are now in common use in England. They are issued
