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NEW TURN GIVEN LONDON ELECTION CASE;
SERVISS DISCHARGED AND TAKES STAND

SAYS THAT HE HELD ENVELOPES CONTAINING SMALL SUMS OF MONEY

But Contradicts Evidence of Several Crown Witnesses—A Spy in Box Admits He Lied—Tom Lewis Expected Tomorrow—Witnesses Say They Got Money.

From Our Own Reporter.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—The investigation into the London election charges was resumed at 11:30 this morning. It was announced that a warrant had been issued for the arrest of Tom Lewis, of London, who is wanted as a crown witness, but so far he has not been located.

The feature of today's session was the action of Mr. DuVernet, counsel for the prosecution, who asked for the discharge of Wm. Serviss, one of the defendants, in order that he might place him in the box. Mr. Robinson objected, but he was overruled.

The witness did not prove as satisfactory as the prosecution expected, and Mr. DuVernet roundly abused his own witness.

Mr. DuVernet gave out that he intends to prosecute for perjury several of the witnesses who have testified thus far.

Mr. DuVernet applied for a warrant for Mr. U. A. Buchner, the London returning officer in the election of June 13, 1905, because Mr. Buchner had been ordered to be present with his books today, but had failed to put in an appearance. The warrant was refused, and Mr. DuVernet gave notice that he will repeat his request tomorrow if Mr. Buchner is not present.

Mr. Robinson stated to The Advertiser this afternoon that he expects Tom Lewis will be in Toronto this afternoon, and that he will advise him to give himself up at once.

Mr. Sifton is also expected in Toronto today.

Bentley Got No Money.

Arthur Bentley, of London, was the first witness this morning. Before the election witness had been canvassed by one Trudell for William Gray. He told this man he would vote for Gray. Then Serviss canvassed him for Hyman, and he was taken to the Liberal committee rooms, where he met Collins. The latter told him if he would vote the right way he would get \$10, but Collins said he intended to be sure on the matter. If he voted for Gray he would get nothing. He was not inside the committee rooms, and he saw no money in envelopes. Witness did not promise to vote for Hyman. He merely said that he would vote the right way. He did not attempt to get any money from the Liberals after the election.

To Mr. Robinson, witness said Trudell had promised him nothing. He had always voted Tory, except when he voted Liberal. Serviss had merely told witness to go to the committee room. All the transactions took place with Jerry Collins while witness and he were alone.

"If you had been offered money by the Liberals after the election you would have taken it?"

"Very likely—it would have been a big temptation."

Says He Got \$9.

Charles Leach, of London, was next examined. He swore he got \$9 at the Hyman-Gray election. He was met by a Mr. Crocker on the street, who told him money was flush and that he might as well take it. He put his money in his pocket, and he saw the witness to the Liberal committee rooms, where he saw Collins and several others. Who they were he did not know. One of them told him if he voted right he would get the money, and it was put in an envelope for him. He saw no other envelope there. Collins kept back \$1 for a bribe-off when the money was paid over. Witness had voted for Hyman. He had no conversation with Mulloy or anyone else, save Collins and Crocker, as to his vote. The transaction had been with Collins alone.

Forgot How He Voted.

David J. Thomas was the next witness. Mr. DuVernet accused him of having a bad memory in election matters, but Mr. Thomas said his memory was bad in all things. He got money in an envelope at the last election. The money was brought to the house. He did not remember having been at the committee room. He did not remember that he got the money from Serviss. Witness said he had been in the habit of getting money from his boys, and he was not surprised when the money came to the door. Witness created a laugh by declaring that he did not know whom he voted for in the last election.

"It's a year and a half, you know," he said.

Says Collins Gave Him \$5.

John Hyslop swore he got \$5 from Collins, who delivered the money for the election, in a Hyman committee room, where he met Jerry Collins and another man. The money was put in envelopes. There were other envelopes on the table. Jerry Collins paid over the money. He had not seen Hardy or Serviss at all during the election.

Emigh Was Not Paid.

Edward O. Emigh said he was promised money by Jerry Collins if he voted right. Collins said there would be \$10 in it. Witness denied that it was agreed that Serviss should hold the money. There was nothing said as to who should hold the money. Emigh had voted right, but he did not receive the money. He had no knowledge of the money having been paid directly or indirectly to any member of his family.

After the election he asked Collins why he did not get the money, but Collins said he knew nothing of the matter. Collins did not say that anyone was holding the money.

At this point, Mr. Robinson objected to the cross-examination by Mr. DuVernet.

\$200,000 BLAZE AT ST. KITTS;
A BIG WINE PLANT DESTROYED

St. Catharines, Oct. 3.—The Ontario Grape Growing and Wine Manufacturing Company's plant here was burned this morning, entailing a loss of from \$170,000 to \$200,000. All the company's wine in the buildings was destroyed.

The loss is fairly well covered by insurance, but no correct figures are as yet obtainable. The cause of the fire is at present unknown. The company in all probability will rebuild their works, but it will take them years to recover from the blow.

UP IN SMOKE

Seven Million Feet Were Destroyed at Aylmer This Morning.

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—A serious fire broke out in the lumber yard of Fraser & Co. at Aylmer today. There were over 7,000,000 feet burned down before noon, and the 25,000,000 feet which is in the yard is likely to go.

SOLDIER-MONK ELOPES

Rector of a Church in Rome Disappears With Beautiful Girl.

Rome, Oct. 3.—A case resembling the famous Delaurie mystery, which recently caused such a sensation in France, has aroused considerable interest here. A few days ago it was announced that Father Virginio Carones, of the Camillini order, rector of the aristocratic church of Santa Maria Madalena, had resigned from the priesthood and disappeared. It is now known that the ex-priest fled from Italy with a beautiful girl belonging to a distinguished family, and it is reported they are on their way to America. Carones, who is young, tall and handsome, served the usual term in the army, where he was attached to an artillery regiment, and rose to the rank of lieutenant. After leaving the army he became rector of the church of the Santa Maria Madalena, but was recalled to the colors for temporary service, and it is said, managed to combine his two duties. Returning at an early hour from the artillery barracks, he put his monk's robes over his uniform, and in this manner celebrated mass. He was compelled to make the alteration in his costume so hastily that he was unable to take off his military boots, and when kneeling before the altar, the congregation caught glimpses of his spurs beneath his gown.

ITALIANS WENT MAD

Story of the Desperate Assault on the Ranchers at Calgary.

Calgary, Alta., Oct. 2.—News from Cochrane indicates that young Cole, who was stabbed by enraged Italians in the riot on Saturday, is still hovering between life and death. Hewitt, the other victim of the Italians, is here and is in quite a precarious condition. Cole was in no way associated with the riot. People who saw the encounter tell of its intensity. After Hewitt, the man who caused the row, had assaulted the Italians, the entire 30 went mad. They got Hewitt down and all began slashing at him at one time. One old Italian drew a revolver and began shooting at him at random, running all around the infuriated men who encircled the man who was down. Hewitt would have done damage but for the fact that a spectator hit him with a brick, knocking him insensible. Then the riot began in earnest. Residents of the town attempted to rescue Hewitt, but the Italians, leaving Hewitt for a time, started in on the residents, and it looked as though there would be a pitched battle. As the residents gained reinforcements the Italians retreated. Just before the end came Cole was wounded. He is a rancher and came to Cochrane to meet his father and mother, who were coming in on the train. He was carefully kept out of the fight, when an Italian broke away from the row, ran over to him, pulled a knife and plunged it into the young man's liver. The Italians retreated to the car and were taken in shortly after by the Mounted Police. Two Italians who did the worst were held in the cells here. Others were fined from \$5 to \$25 and released.

A CLOSE RACE

Was Almost Put Out of the Running for the Hyman Trophy.

At the annual tournament of the Forest City Quilting Club this morning, Bob Callender, of Toronto, had a close call from being put out of the running for the Hyman trophy. His opponent was Miller, of South Bend, Ind., and Callender only managed to pull out two shots to the good. In the early stage of the match it was all Callender. Miller did not appear to strike his gait until the play was half over. At one stage the score stood 15 to 4 in favor of the Toronto man. Later it was 25 to 11 in his favor, and when Callender had reached 32 Miller was only 25. It was then that Miller settled down and began to overhaul his opponent. He gradually overhauled Callender, and when the latter had 39 to the good and only had two more shots to go, Miller had climbed up to 38. The next end went to Miller, and the score was tied. Miller, however, lost the next two ends and Callender won out. Jim Bell did not play this morning, drawing a bye.

In the match which was unfinished yesterday afternoon, Callender defeated Weir 41 to 18.

HOUSEKEEPER SUES

Wants to Recover Under Will of Man by Whom She Was Employed.

Two cases were disposed of in the county non-jury trial yesterday before Judge Macbeth. In the case of Harriet Gibson vs. Campbell, judgment was reserved. According to the evidence the plaintiff had worked as housekeeper for John D. Anderson, of Mount Brydges, for 23 years, on a salary of \$1 a week and board. In addition to doing the regular housework she had also milked nine or ten cows and acted as nurse to Mr. Anderson up to the time of his death last November. By way of recompense, the deceased has put in trust two promissory notes, to be paid to Miss Gibson after his demise, and also settled upon her an annuity of \$100. The executor refused to recognize the notes, and the suit resulted. The notes amounted to \$350. Judgment was rendered for the full amount of the claim in the case of J. W. Peck vs. T. Fox, for non-payment of \$120 and interest on goods sold.

A MONARCH'S PERIL

Anarchist Chief Shook Hands With the Italian King.

Milan, Oct. 3.—Excitement has been caused by the discovery that the notorious anarchist Dutto lately gained admission to the palace at Racconigi and shook hands with King Victor Emmanuel. Dutto, who represented himself as a professional entertainer, applied to the police for permission to give a biograph show in the palace. The police applied to the palace officials, who obtained the King's consent. The show went off serenely and the King rewarded the entertainer generously. When his majesty bade Dutto farewell he shook hands with him. The king was afterwards shocked to find that the entertainer was the well-known anarchist, who thus had had the King at his mercy. Though no harm was done the police are suing Dutto for making a false statement.

ROUND ROBIN ASKS THE MAYOR
TO SEND MATTHEWS TO DALLAS

Alderman Has Not Given Up Hope of Attending Fire Chief's Convention.

Ald. Matthews has not yet abandoned all hopes of attending the convention of fire chiefs, to be held next week at Dallas, Texas, at the expense of the city.

When the matter came up in the council on Monday night it was decided by a vote of 6 to 5 to leave Ald. Matthews at home and send Fire Chief Clark only. Ald. Matthews was disappointed. He wanted to be on the deputation, because he had been connected with the fire and light committee for the past three years, and had never attended such a convention.

And now a round-robin is being circulated among the aldermen, asking the mayor to empower Ald. Matthews to attend the convention, the city to pay the shot. It was reported at the city hall today that yesterday morning Ald. Matthews went to Mayor Judd and asked him if he could not do something to have him sent to Dallas. The alderman said he was not very much fascinated by the long journey, but he did not like the idea of being humiliated after it had been generally understood that he was to go.

To enable him to attend, the round-robin will have to be signed by a majority of the members of the council. When the vote was taken on Monday evening, Ald. Forlister, Matthews, Booth, Wyatt and Mayor Judd—a total

of five—supported the sending of the chairman of No. 3 committee and the fire chief; Ald. Greenlee, Cooper, Gillean, Saunders, Garratt and Gerry—a total of six—voting to send the fire chief only. Ald. Stevenson did not arrive until after the vote was taken, and Ald. Armstrong was absent from the city on business.

Should any of the members who opposed the sending of Ald. Matthews on Monday night see fit to sign the round-robin, the alderman may take the much-coveted trip, but to secure a majority of the council three will have to be won over, as only four of the aldermen were favorable on Monday.

Nevertheless, it remains that Ald. Matthews is still anxious to escape that humiliation.

"If Ald. Matthews had done the right thing on Monday evening," said an alderman today, "and withdrawn his statements about members of the council having been approached by the G. T. R. in reference to impending negotiations, he would have easily secured a majority of the aldermen to support his going to Texas, but as it was he was humiliated, and several of the city fathers would not vote for him. Later in the evening Ald. Gillean moved that Ald. Matthews retract the statements, but Ald. Matthews was still mum."

Another alderman said that if he had been in Ald. Matthews' place on Monday evening he would not have entered any protest against the action of the council in deciding to have him stay at home. Neither would he take the trip on the strength of a round-robin, after being turned down so hard at the meeting.

MORMON LEADER ARRESTED

Joseph F. Smith Is Accused of Having Lived With Five Wives.

Salt Lake City, Oct. 3.—The president of the Mormon Church, Joseph F. Smith, was arrested and bound over to the district court today on the charge of living unlawfully with five wives. The complaint was sworn to by a Mormon deputy sheriff, the warrant was served by order of a Mormon sheriff and the committing magistrate is also a Mormon. President Smith was arraigned immediately after his arrest and waived preliminary hearing. After being bound over he was released on his own recognizance.

President Smith reached here two days ago on his return from Europe. He then began an attempt had been made to secure his arrest for a statutory offense in connection with the birth of his 43rd child. The complaint was made from a distinctly anti-Mormon source. The county attorney refused to approve a prosecution on this charge. The attorney was then cited to appear in court and show cause why he should not be compelled to act in the matter. After the hearing the court held that the attorney was justified in refusing to prosecute, because the complainant offered no evidence, that the mother of the child was not the wife of President Smith.

Whatever the motive back of the day's proceedings, the effect will be to disarm the criticism that has been directed against the authorities for their failure to take cognizance of the admissions by President Smith before the senate committee during the investigation of the Smoot case.

GOT CHECK FOR \$3,150

Received Rental and Percentage from Pere Marquette for Last Quarter.

City Clerk Baker this morning received a check from the Pere Marquette Railway for \$3,142.15.

The check was in payment of the rental for the quarter ended Sept. 30, and the percentage on earnings of the road over a certain amount. Two thousand five hundred dollars of the sum was due for rental.

MURDER IN COURT.

Askabad, Trans-Caucasian Territory, Russia, Oct. 2.—During the trial yesterday the second accusation of the jury who murdered here in June, an unknown man entered the court room and held the judge advocate, General Rinkevich, and attempted to shoot the president of the court, General Ushakov, but was shot down by an officer.

Relation of King Edward
Murdered in Prussian Town

Miss Madelain Lake, Daughter of English Army Officer Brutally Killed in a City Park of Essen.

Essen, Prussia, Oct. 3.—A great sensation has been caused here by the murder of Miss Madelain Lake, daughter of an English army officer, whose body, terribly mutilated, Monday evening was found in the city park. The police have been unable to throw any light on the mystery surrounding her death. Both temples were beaten, her throat was lacerated by the hands of her murderer, who evidently strangled her in addition to beating her terribly about the head, and her arms and body were severely bruised.

The excitement caused by this horrible crime in a public park, almost in daylight, apparently, has been increased by the fact that the inquiries of the authorities have resulted in seemingly establishing the fact that Miss Lake was related, distantly, to the British royal family, the brother of her grandmother, it is stated, having married a daughter of Caroline Amelia Elizabeth of Brunswick, the divorced wife of George IV. of England.

CHATHAM HUNTER
DEAD AT ERIE LAKE

Body of Jas. F. Riddell Found With Gunshot Wound in the Head.

Chatham, Oct. 3.—James F. Riddell, a popular young man of 28 years, was found dead near Erie Eau, south of this city, Monday night, with a gunshot wound in his head.

The young man had been missing since Saturday, when he had gone duck shooting. When he did not return within a reasonable time, his friends at the place began to look for him, but it was not until Monday night that his people in this city were notified.

A brother immediately left for the place, and soon, with the assistance of a scouting party, found the body near the house where he temporarily had lived.

He was shot in the head, and there is much speculation as to how it happened, and several theories are advanced.

Accidental death, however, is receiving the majority of adherents.

CHAMBERLAIN'S HEALTH

His Nephew Says the Alarmist Rumors Are Without Foundation.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Mr. Norman Chamberlain, a nephew of Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, at present visiting Toronto, stated tonight that alarmist rumors regarding his uncle's health were entirely unfounded.

OTTAWA TYPOS WITHDRAW

Refuse To Pay the Assessment To American Strike Fund.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—The members of the Ottawa Typographical Union have withdrawn from the International Union by a vote of 60 to 30, and formed an independent union, with Ald. Boudreau as president. The Ottawa printers declined to pay the assessment for the eight-hour fight to the international body.

FILIPINOS ARE ALARMED

Fear Effect of Cuban Trouble on Their Chance of Self-Government.

Manila, Oct. 3.—Seventeen provincial governors opened in the city hall yesterday the annual convention of governors. The independence party proved to be in a large majority, and elected a Nationalist chairman. Other governors will arrive this week.

The convention will consider the scheme for the election of a Philippine assembly, the road law, and provincial requirements in general, and will forward its recommendations to the Philippine commission.

All the governors manifest the deepest interest in the situation in Cuba. They fear that the failure of the Cuban republic will influence Americans against the proposed Philippine assembly, and restrict the present policy of freely extending autonomy to a people confessedly generations behind the Cubans.

A GIRL TERRORIST.

Toulon, France, Oct. 3.—A girl arrested here on the charge of throwing a bomb at the governor of Ekaterinoslav, and who claimed to be a Russian, turns out to be French. Her name is Jeanne Tilley, and as a result of association with Russian students in the Latin Quarter of Paris, she joined the Terrorists and undertook the task of killing a prominent Russian official.

A SCHOOL OF ANARCHY.

Madrid, Oct. 3.—The attorney-general in presenting in court today the case of Senor Ferrer, director of the modern school of Barcelona, who is charged with being connected with the attempt on the life of King Alfonso on May 31 last, submitted evidence to prove that the prisoner, under the name of the "Modern School," conducted an establishment for teaching anarchy to youths, was privy to Manuel Morales' plot to assassinate King Alfonso, aided Morales with money and assisted in concealing and disguising the would-be assassin's accomplice after the bomb explosion of May 31.

NO MILITARISM HERE

Sir Frederick Borden Makes That Plain at London Banquet.

London, Oct. 2.—C. H. Wilkinson was president at the banquet last night given by the directors of the British Columbia Development Company at the Princess restaurant.

Sir Frederick Borden, responding to the toast to the Dominion of Canada, gave a glowing account of the prosperity of the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific. He did not believe there was any militarism in Canada, nor was there any likelihood of there being any. He could not understand why anyone should make such a statement as that militarism existed in Canada.

Major Howard, agent-general of Nova Scotia, responding to the toast to that province, laid particular stress on the opportunities Nova Scotia offered for not only agricultural emigrants, but for those who had money to invest.
