MORAL INSTRUCTION IN PUBLIC SCHOOL

Rev. E. B. Lancelley Advocates
Adoption of Text Book—Time
'Twas Done, He Says.

At the Dundas Center Methodist
Church yesterday morning, the pastor,
Rev. E. B. Lancelley, pronounced him-
self as strongly in favor of a text
book on morals in the public schools.
Mr. Lancelley was discussing the text,
"Train Up a Child in the Way He
Should Go" (Proverbs xxii, 6), and he
said experience proved that mankind
needs training in truthfulness and
honesty. Youth is the proper time to
begin all culture, both moral and in-
tellectual. Could all the children of
the world be put under proper in-
fluences it would be possible to make
all intelligent and upright when they
came to mature years. In the absence
of all education for just one genera-
tion, there would not be one scholar
left on the earth. Not one person
could read the Bible or any book in
his own tongue.

Provision, Mr. Lancelley said, should
be made for a course of instruction in
morals for the youth of today. Is
morality not taught in the schools to-
day? Some would ask. The schools to-
day, the school regulations say that
morality shall be taught indirectly,
thus leaving the matter largely to the
discretion of the teacher. Teaching
morality in the schools would leave the
churches still open to do their work.

One reason for advocating such a text
book was that through the schools a
greater number of the rising genera-
tion could be reached than in any other
way. One-fifth of London's popula-
tion was to be found daily in the
schools. One million of Canada's popu-
lation are in the schools. No addi-
tional expense would be incurred by
the adoption of moral instruction. The
statement would be made by some that
time would not permit of any more
subjects being placed on the school
curriculum, but in answer to that Mr.
Lancelley said that some of the pre-
sent lessons might be abolished entire-
ly or greatly shortened. The result of
moral instruction in the public schools
would be that morality and practical
life would go together, which is one of
the most useful things today. Nothing
is more needed in Canada now
than definite ideas of what is right,
and a set of principles to guide the
ideas are carried out. They are needed
in the church, in society, in politics
—everywhere. The place to begin after
the home is in the public schools. Pro-
per drill in the schools on the true
idea of what is right will elevate the
standard of morality more than 50 per
cent in the next generation.

"It is high time we should unite on
something of this kind," declared Mr.
Lancelley. "It will not involve a change
of teachers. The whole tendency of the
public schools is to elevate, but this
good influence may be greatly im-
paired by the study of morals. Pro-
vide a text book on morals in the
schools, and in 25 years you will be
able to close one half of the jails and
penitentiaries. I would like to see it
adopted for the Province, and if the
Province will not make it everywhere
compulsory, it could be made com-
pulsory in school boards to act in the
matter if they saw fit."

EDWARD'S PLAN IN ABEYANCE

Hoped He Would Effect Recon-
ciliation Between France
and Vatican.

London, April 28.—It was hoped in
high quarters a few days ago that a
reconciliation between France and the
Vatican might be effected through the
mediation of King Edward.

There is reason to believe that the
matter was carefully considered in
Paris during the King's visit at the
outset of the present tour, and that
preliminary arrangements were made.
It was for this reason that the King
of Italy left Rome to meet King Ed-
ward at Gaeta so that there would be
no embarrassment of non-intercourse
between the two sovereigns.

King Edward was then to visit Rome
in the absence of King Victor Em-
manuel and an informal mediation
with the church authorities might have
been undertaken.

The plan, however, was interfered
with at this point. It is hinted that
the hitch was due to a protest of the
Roman Government.

It hardly seems probable that the
Liberal leader feared the effect upon
any intercourse between the sovereign
and the authorities of the Roman
Catholic Church. The matter is said
to be still in abeyance. King Edward
is spending the interval in tours of the
country in the south of Italy.

DISEASE FOLLOWS WAKE OF FAMINE

Prince Lvoff, of Russia, Appeals
for Speediest Possible
Help.

St. Petersburg, April 23.—Prince
Lvoff, head of the Zemstvo organiza-
tion for famine relief, who returned
here today from the famine districts,
reports that the crucial moment has
arrived.

Scarcity is spreading widely and
rapidly in Ufa Province, and has
appeared in the provinces of Samara,
Saratov, Kazan and Tambov. Ergo-
tism (poisoning from ergotized grain)
also is widely prevalent, the inhabi-
tants of whole villages being affected
by the convulsions characteristic of the
disease.

The Government distributions of
grain are on the same scale as during
the winter, but private relief has been
enlarged to the greatest extent pos-
sible with the funds available, the
Zemstvo organization alone feeding 1-
and 2-1/2 million persons. The free kitchens cost
\$750,000 monthly, and an extension of
the work is demanded everywhere. In
spite of the activity of the Zemstvos,
Red Cross and Free Economic Society,
the official reports show that over 100,000
persons in Samara, 236,000 in Ufa and
78,000 in Kazan Provinces are still in
need of assistance, while the scope of
the work in Saratov Province should
be doubled.

possible forwarding of the money col-
lected in America.

The Government crop report pre-
sents a discouraging picture of the
prospects in the central famine region,
where the spring sowing is restricted
by the lack of seed grain. American
wheat is being purchased for seed, as
it is considered to be of better quality
than Russian wheat.

The winter crops, except in the south
of Russia, are backward, owing to the
cold weather and late spring.

DENOUNCES QUEST FOR NORTH POLE

Labrador Missionary Says Ex-
plorers Are a Menace to
Eskimo Race.

New York, April 27.—Polar expedi-
tions are denounced by Dr. Wilfred T.
Grenfell as the cause of vice and crime
which are fast exterminating the race
of northern people. The doctor is
known the world over for his mission-
ary work among the natives of the
Labrador coast.

"There won't be an Eskimo living in
a few years, unless Arctic expeditions
cease," says Dr. Grenfell. "It is not
the 'white man's burden.' It is the
Eskimo's burden. Exploring parties
commit awful sins against the northern
natives. The Eskimo race is doomed.
The white man is killing him with
liquor and vice. Eskimos who went
to Buffalo and Chicago to the fairs of
the white man returned to Hebron
with disease."

"Look at the pictures in the stereo-
opticon views shown at explorers' lec-
tures and you will see Eskimos, so-
called, that are almost white. That is
one of the white man's sins."

"There is no necessity for polar ex-
plorations. I am satisfied there is
nothing at the pole except an open
sea, which freezes over. There is no
land there. One might just as well go
out in the broad Atlantic from Coney
Island on a cake of ice to prove some-
thing as to drift across the north
pole."

"The Eskimos are dying like flies as
a result of vice which the white man
has taught them."

"Do you refer to any particular ex-
plorer in your statement of condi-
tions?" he was asked.

"I do not. While the explorer him-
self may not commit crimes against
home and decency, the men under him
do."

LACK TEACHERS IN NORTHWEST

Saskatchewan Minister of Edu-
cation Tells of Province's
Needs.

Winnipeg, Man., April 26.—James A.
Caldier, minister of education in the
Saskatchewan Administration, while in
this city said that the demand for
teachers in Saskatchewan is still far
in excess of the local supply. 250 new
school districts were opened last year
in the province, and it is expected that
300 will be opened during the current
year. The province of Alberta opened
170 new school districts last year and
will open 200 during the current. There
are 100 students in the Normal School
of Saskatchewan. These students are
now writing on their examinations and
will be available for positions at once.

During the past five years the prov-
ince of Alberta and Saskatchewan
have drawn on the eastern portion of
the Dominion for teachers at the rate
of 300 per year. This has partially
supplied the west, but it has created
a scarcity in the east and resulted in
raising the salaries in all parts of
Canada. The salaries paid in the prov-
ince of Saskatchewan range from \$500
to \$600 per year and there is little dif-
ference between those paid male and
female teachers. The two provinces
together will require additional teach-
ers at the rate of 500 a year and it is
doubtful from what sources the com-
plete supply is to come.

Speaking of the progress of the cap-
ital, Mr. Caldier stated that there will
be more building done this year than
in any previous year. About double
the amount of street improvements will
be made on all municipal work. There
has been continued difficulty in getting
the required building material, and
during the past year a large amount
of work which should have been done
throughout the province by the Gov-
ernment had to be deferred owing to
the fact that the Canadian Pacific
found it impossible to get sufficient
quantities of lumber through from the
west. It is anticipated that all the
preliminary work in connection with
the building of the new provincial
buildings will be completed during the
next few months and some of the
work on the foundations will be done
this fall.
