Fire Chief John Aitken has submitted the needs of the denartment for the year. He wants a motor ladder truck. It will be necessary, in case the machine is not purchased, to secure four good horses. The truck, in his opinion, is the more advantaceous. The long distances to be covered make it almost impossible for the horses to drag the heavy machine to all parts of the city.

The department answered 222 alarms during the year. There were 13 chimney fires, 36 false alarms, and 6 test runs. The total loss on buildings was \$15,562, and on contents \$52 627. The central station answered 180 alarms. The department traveled about 1.480 miles, and the men worked a total of 487 hours. During the period 56,000 feet of hose was laid. The most serious fires were at Hyman's Tannery, and the W. A. Jenkins' Manufacturing Company, the total loss being about \$50,000 in the two fires.


