ASSEMBLY ADJOURNS National Service Commission To Deal With Soldier Problem.

What the Assembly Did. Referred the question of throwing the office of moderator open to elders to the Presbytery to report on. Accepted the resignation of Rev. Dr. Shearer to take effect September 1, but deferred the appointment of a successor.

Appointed a committee of fifty to take charge of the Forward movement. Appointed a national service commission with Rev. Dr. A. Grant as convener to deal with the returned soldier problem.

Took Alberta College, Red Deer, under the direct authority of the church. Approved of the Government call for day of national prayer and humiliation on June 24.

Everything went smooth as an assembly of the Presbytery Church in the last lap of its race on Thursday afternoon to wind up the enormous docket of business left for the last day of 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

of Ottawa, in connection with the discussion by the assembly of the report of the board on religious education on Saturday was dropped for the time being at least, though it was anticipated that action of the assembly on this matter would constitute one of the important features of the business transacted this year.

At the time the resolution was submitted, Dr. Milne stated he was obliged to return to Ottawa. A plan for consideration of it was to be found by the committee on the assembly's docket, and it was to be seconded and supported by Rev. Dr. R. M. Dickie of Montreal. Dr. Dickie stated at the closing sederunt that in the absence of Dr. Milne he would not proceed with the matter.

Confer With Board. A strong committee was named and approved by the assembly to confer with the board of home missions and social service in regard to the future policy of the church, and the filling of the office made vacant by the resignation of Rev. Dr. Shearer to the secretaryship of the Social Service Council of Canada.

Report Adopted. An overture of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa on the relationship of the General Assembly to the church was reported upon by Rev. Dr. Bryce, convener of a committee appointed to report on the subject. The following were the main features of the report: adopted and to be sent to the Presbytery for consideration.



QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send In Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information By The Advertiser.

B. T. R. Q.—Where was the 116th Battalion trained, where did they leave for overseas, and how can I get in touch with a soldier in that Battalion?

A.—It was mobilized at Uxbridge under Lieut.-Col. Sara Sharpe. As it is in Military District No. 2, there is no information regarding when it left. If you have his name and number, address him as a member of the C. O. at the Army Postoffice, London, Eng.

AN INQUIRER. Q.—I would a man, 23 years of age, who has seen service in Bermuda, from September, 1914, to December, 1916, returned to Canada and discharged as medically unfit, be liable under the M. S. A.?

A.—Yes; a man must have served in a theatre of actual war to be exempted.

B. E. R. Q.—I. Where would one apply to join the Canadian navy? 2. What is the pay? 3. What are the qualifications required for the R. F. C.?

AGE was registered. Will he have to carry a birth certificate or is his exemption paper sufficient? 2. What ages must register June 22? A.—1. Exemption paper is sufficient. 2. All persons 18 years and over.

R. T. Q.—I. Would a person who was exempt last fall until July 1, and has not received notice to report, have to register June 22? 2. Are all exemptions from 23 years up also cancelled by the order-in-council? 3. Can a person 20 years of age and almost helpless be compelled to register June 22?

A.—1. Yes; everybody not in uniform has to register for national service. 2. The order-in-council gives power to the Government to call up men of any class or age, regardless of any exemptions previously granted. It has only been enforced so far with re-

pect to those who had not attained the age of 23 at the time they filled out their application forms for exemption last fall. 2. If such persons will notify the registrar of their inability to register prior to June 22, efforts will be made to register them in their homes, the official announcements state.

R. H. Q.—A young man, 23 years old, enlisted in the spring of 1916, and after two or three weeks of service was discharged as medically unfit, being given a linen discharge paper and good conduct mark. After being home, he was notified to report May 21, and he wrote to headquarters, telling them where to find his discharge, number, etc. June 15, the military police came to arrest him as a deserter. Showing his paper made no difference. Could he not have refused to go after show-

ing his paper? The police said not. The Government tells us if we show such papers they cannot arrest us. The boy was taken away from producing foodstuffs. What can be done? A.—Let him lay his grievance before his commanding officer, and he will register them in their homes, the official announcements state.

PATRIOTIC GIRL. Q.—Where could one report for duty with the "Ladies' Battalion"? What are the qualifications? A.—Write to Miss A. MacArthur, Lambeth, Ont.

S. O. S. Q.—What papers if any are necessary for a man passed 45 years of age to carry in order to cross to the United States? A.—He should have a passport. Write to Riggs, Dominion Immigration Office, Carling Block, London, Ont.

G. B. Q.—Are the married men with children called in the same class as married men without children, or are they called in separate classes? A.—All married men are grouped together in the present classification, which is arranged according to ages. If possible the married men should be called, it is possible that some allowances might be made for those who have children.
