ONE BIG UNION OF CITIZENS PROPOSAL UNDER INVESTIGATION

Would Protect Communities From Fuel or Food Famines.

COMMITTEE INQUIRES

New York Chamber of Commerce Is Looking Into Feasibility of Scheme.

New York, May 12.—An investigation of the "one big union of citizens" idea and its feasibility in protecting American communities from possible fuel or food famines during strikes, is now In a resolution the veterans approved the actions of Cols. To prevent the "tying up and throtling of whole communities," the committee has received hundreds of sponses to blank questionnaires specify-ing the ability and equipment of the various volunteers. Their occupation. home addresses and telephone numbers together with other similar data are in time of crisis may be utilized. The chamber at a recent meeting authorizing the appointment of the com-mittee by President Alfred E. Marling, mittee by President Alfred E. Marling, passed resolutions in which it said that "civilization is now menaced by false and distorted and political ideas, and the public welfare demands that the and women of the nation, who

hold to high ideals of personal and po-litical conduct, who believe in sound economic principles, and in constitutional government, shall undertake more resolutely to fulfill their civic duties. The resolutions further declared that "the structure of government, and society as a whole" was imperilled by the interruption of the normal channels of communication and public service due to "an irresponsible minority of the population of the United States." It further stated that the duties of the committee on public welfare should be to draw up "a plan of organization and co-operation whereby the public may, by volunteer service, aid in maintaining the uninterrupted use of public utilities and assist the duly constituted authorities in preserving leaves and each or the service of the ities in preserving law and order."

London, April 28.—(Associated Press),

Mr. Dyott told the Royal Geographical Society. "We have heard of the great height of the Andes, but there are low altitudes at which they may be crossed One of the they may be crossed. One of the Andes ridges can be negotiated at a height of 7,000 feet, but there is another rising to 15,600 feet.

"Peru," he continued, "is peculiarly suitable for aerial traffic. Aerial high-ways will undoubtedly play a large part in the future development of that country. It is of importance that ranid try.
