REQUEST FOR RENEWAL OF THE C.A.P. SERVICE

RICHARD BLAIN WOULD KILL THE CIGARET EVIL

Amounts Expended on Service by Annual Attempt Made to Interest Government—Outlay For House of Commons in the "Burning" Question.

OTTAWA, March 16.—(Special.)—Among the bills read a third time today was one to incorporate the Bank of Hamilton Pension Fund.

Replying to a question by Mr. Foster, Mr. Graham said that Kenneth Falconer had reorganized the bookkeeping system of the I. C. R. and P. E. Railway at a cost of \$45,084.

Mr. Armstrong was informed that on March 21, 1907, there were 229,923 acres of Indian lands not disposed of by the Dominion Government. The Indians own 2309 unsold islands, irrespective of those contiguous to the Manitowish lands, which have been surveyed.

In reply to Dr. Roche, the finance minister said the following amounts had been paid to the Canadian Association Press during the year ended June 30, 1904: \$12,500; 1905, \$11,582; 1906, \$10,765; 1907, \$10,000; seven months ended March 31, 1908, \$2316. The subsidy expires June 30, 1908.

A request for renewal had been made. No proposal had been made for a government subsidy to a domestic (Canadian) news service, nor was the government aware of a proposal to confine the cable news subsidy to papers subscribing to a domestic service.

Mr. Herron was informed that from March 1, 1907, to July 1, 1907, the government had expended \$274,150 on immigration, and for the months of March and April, 1908, \$447,500. For the first three months of 1908, \$36,047 was paid in bonus and for the latter period \$24,000.

Mr. Wilson of Lennox was informed that in eight years the government had expended \$175,787, and from July 1 to March 1, 1907, there had been expended \$32,433 on immigrant hospitals.

During the same period Dr. Schaffner was paid \$90,000 and \$130,000 had been expended on emigration from the United States.

OTTAWA, March 16.—(Special.)—Mr. Blain made his annual attempt tonight to grapple with the cigarette evil by submitting a resolution declaring among other things that smoking of cigars has been proved to be productive of serious physical and moral injury to young people, impairing health, arresting development, weakening intellectual power, and thus constituting a social and national evil. The resolution also provided for the sale of cigars has not proven sufficient to prevent these evils, which will continue while public sale of the cause of the mischief is permitted to go on; that the most effectual remedy for these evils is to be found in the enactment and enforcement of the law prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of cigars and it is expedient to bring in a bill for this purpose.

There was no objection to the resolution, but Mr. Fisher advised Mr. Blain to introduce a bill to prohibit the sale of cigars. Mr. Sproule pointed out that measures effecting the revenue of the country could only be introduced by the government.

A South African Dominion.

LONDON, March 16.—At Cape Town Sir W. Hely Hutchinson, unveiling the war memorial, said just as Franco-British Canada is urged to take its battlefields as a national park, thus commemorating the complete acceptance of the results of the struggle of 10 years ago, so South Africa might unite in dedicating their lives to the building up under the British flag of a great dominion, which would be the best and most enduring memorial to the dead.

WINNIPEG, March 16.—Dr. Oscar Margoules was to-day placed on trial for causing the death of Bertha Edwards during an illegal operation.

VICE PRESIDENT WINS HIS CASE AT HAMILTON

New York Defeated by Y. M. C. A. Basketball Team—General News of a Busy City.

HAMILTON, March 16.—(Special.)—At the non-jury sitting of the high court, opened to-day by Chief Justice Meredith, Ben Broughton, vice-president of the Hamilton Stamp & Stencil Co., won his suit against Harry Barnard, the president of the company.

When the company was formed each of the parties to the suit took an equal number of shares, and it was especially provided that Mr. Barnard, the president, was not to have a casting vote. Trouble arose last year, and by means of the casting vote Mr. Barnard cut off the salary of the vice-president and discharged him and some of the employees of the company.

The vice-president then brought suit to restrain the president from using the casting vote. The chief justice gave him judgment and added the costs, which are heavy, on the president. The suit of Karin Bros., who are suing the Ontario Pipe Line Co. for \$25,000 for alleged breach of contract, was commenced this afternoon. William H. Benner, formerly of Hamilton, died this afternoon at the residence of his son-in-law, H. Merritt, 23 Duke-street, leaving a wife and a daughter of the deceased.

The Hamilton Y.M.C.A. basketball team defeated New York this evening in a very fast game by 29 to 27. The first half was played under the American rules, and the visitors led at half-time by 11 to 7.
