The Omelette Souffle

By HERBERT KAUFMAN.

There is a vast distinction between distribution for the sake of increasing the circulation figures and distribution for the sake of increasing the number of advertising responses. There is a difference between street sales at hours when the reader has but scant opportunity to look thru the scare heads and street sales when the reader is either going to or returning

There is a difference between a circulation which strikes the same reader several times in the same day and the circulation which does not repeat the individual. There is a difference between circulation which is concentrated into an area from which every reader can be expected to come to your establishment if you can interest him, and a circulation that spreads over half a dozen states and shows its greatest volume in territory so far from your establishment that you can't get a buyer out of ten thousand

You've got to weigh and measure all these things when you weigh and measure circulation figures. It isn't the number of copies printed, but the number of copies sold—not the number of papers distributed, but the number of papers distributed in near-enough territory- not the number of readers reached, but the number of readers who have the price to buy what you want to sell—that determine the value of circulation to you.

Yon can take a single egg and whip it into an omelette souffle which seems to be a whole plateful, but the extra bulk is just hot air and sugarthe change in form has not changed the amount of egg substance—it's the substance in circulation, just as it is the nutrition in the egg that counts.

These three newspapers are mentioned because they are at the very front of the business, and they are mentioned because it seems high time for the press to consider its responsibility in promoting the sale of lots here, there and everywhere on glowing promises of huge profits, and pushing the sale far and near of shares in alleged mines which never were, and never will be, worked. It is all very well to say that the business manager of a newspaper cannot investigate remote mining claims, but he can read the advertisement he is asked to print, and when he sees that it is bait for suckers and absolutely nothing else he can refuse to assist in gouging readers who to some extent trust his journal—altho every year sees the confidence of the reading public in the press diminish. Within a week I have had a call from man who invested a round sum of money in the shares of a so-called mine widely advertised in the Toronto dailies -a Canadian resident in the United States, who had carried away with him the notion that the leading newspapers of this country would not boom a minlure investors into ventures in which Saturday Night, May 30, 1908. they had no faith and in which they were not putting their own money. But what does a man find who goes to a daily newspaper office to enquire about the hundred dollars he put into a min-ing or town lot venture—a deal which the newspaper put thru, in its advertising capacity acting as agent or canvasser? He finds that the newspaper knows nothing about the matter, except that copy for the advertisement was submitted in the usual way and paid for. It seems quite reasonable to suppose that if newspapers do not exercise an increased caution in their efforts to protect their readers against alluring and misleading advertisements, the


