Arms and ammunition are reaching the tribesmen in alarming quantities from across the Afghan frontier. Mazrullah Khan, brother of the ameer of Afghan-istan, who is notoriously anti-British is becoming increasingly powerful at Kabul and in India he is regarded as a constant menace to peace. Mazrullah is reported to be preaching a holy war among the tribesmen in the British

phere of influence.
The Waziris, whose spirit of indethe wazins, whose spirit of inde-pendence was in no way dampened by the defeats they suffered at the hands of the last British expedition, are be-ing wrought up by a fanatical mullah named Pojindar, who is now on his way-to Kabul to concult with Mazrullah
