He came to Hants in 1897. He is fast on the ice and a good shot.

## These Teams Fought.

Hockey is taken seriously in some parts of Ontario. Of a game at Brockville this week a dispatch says—

"The contest was one of the poorest exhibitions of hockey ever witnessed in Brockville. Due in a large measure to the rough tactics of the Kingston men. They used their weight on the Brockville light forward line and resorted to rough tactics, which finally resulted in a free fight in which players and spectators took part. Early in the game Kingston displayed a dirty temper and appeared bent on winning at all hazards. The Brockville pushed them hard in the second half, and were entirely unable to cope with the situation. He penalized both sides frequently, but no punishment was apparently severe enough to scare the offenders. With five minutes to play, Mahood gave Service a nasty cross-check and followed it up by striking him across the forehead with his stick, inflicting a nasty cut. Both players clinched and the players of respective sides, in attempting to separate them, got into difficulties. Van Horne, the Kingston player, deliberately struck an inoffensive opponent named Hayward, standing to one side, bringing him to the ice in a senseless condition with a rap on the head from his stick. This was a signal for the mob to interfere, and instantly the rail birds were on the ice, plunging right and left. It was with difficulty that the police cleared the mob. Great indignation was expressed over Van Horne's cowardly act, and the fact that he quickly got under cover saved him from personal injury. He went off for the rest of the match, and Hayward, who was unconscious for several minutes, eventually revived, but was unable to continue in the game. The Kingston players were escorted to their hotel quarters by the police, followed by a howling mob of enraged rovers.

At Arnprior, Ont., the game has got into the police court. An Arnprior despatch of Tuesday says—"Not wishing to allow Pembroke all the glory in the Police Court assault and battery case against Billy Pearson, the heavyweight cover of the Arnprior, has laid information against Thomas Benson, of the Pembroke team, for assault and battery on Parnell McConigal, an Arnprior forward. Both cases will be heard before Police Magistrate Curney tomorrow afternoon. Prominent citizens are summoned as witnesses."

## The Jumping Record.

William E. Quinn, the athlete, who has achieved wonderful success jumping with ice skates, has decided to go in quest of new laurels at the perilous sport. He will now endeavor to clear five feet in height on ice. The present record, held by himself is 4 feet 10 inches, made last spring. Quinn is a wonder at this sort of feat. He is remarkably agile, and being very sure-footed when shod with steel runners, does not take the risk which ordinarily accompanies skate jumping. He is a graceful jumper, and clears the bar without apparent effort. His method of jumping is a surprising to those who first see it. He does not skate toward the bar. Instead he takes two long leaps and then rises lightly in the air, settling over the obstacle as if it required no effort.
