Condensed Chronology.

A large part of the time and labor devoted
to the study of history is generally lost, because

chronology of the events recorded.

Chronology treats of the computation of time

to 2544 years.

The antediluvian ages are not subdivided
into periods.

The post-advant ages are divisible into
eight periods:

1. From the deluge, B. C. 2348, to the call
of Abraham, B. C. 1921-427 years.

kind.

Among the plants of Guinea one of the
most curious is the cannon-ball tree. It grows to
the height of sixty feet, and its flowers are
remarkable for beauty and fragrance.

The fruit resembles enormous cannon-balls,
hence the name. However, some say it is
more so called because of the noise which the
balls make in bursting.

This tree is found on the islands of the
Pacific Ocean. The trunk rises to the height of
thirty or forty feet, and attains the size of a
man's body.

This is a very useful tree to the natives; for,
besides its fruit, which supplies them with
food, its trunk furnishes timber for their houses
and canoes; the gum which exudes from it
serves as pitch for the vessels, and from the
fibres of the inner bark a cloth is made to
cover their persons.

This tree is found in China. It is called the
Tallow tree because a substance is obtained
from it resembling tallow, and which is used
for the same purpose. It grows from twenty
to forty feet in height.
