### HINTS FOR THE COOK

Tapoca Custard.  
One quart milk, half cup tapoca, steam one and a half hours. Add beaten yolks of two eggs, half cup sugar. Remove from fire.

Delicious Gingerbread  
One cup granulated sugar. Add 2 tablespoons of molasses, 4 of melted butter, 1 even teaspoon of salt, 1 dessert-spoon of cinnamon and a teaspoon of

mixed spices. Stir and rub well together, then add 1 beaten egg and 1 cup of sour milk (real sour). Then sift 1 even teaspoon of soda with 2 cups of flour, sift it into the other mixture and beat about 2 minutes. Then turn it into 9-inch square tin, 1½ inches deep, sprinkle sugar over the top and bake 10 minutes in a moderate oven.

Nut Cake.  
One-half cup butter, one and a half cups sugar, whites of three eggs, one cup milk, two teaspoons baking powder, two cups flour and one pound nuts, reserving a few half nuts for top.

## WOULD TAX LARGE FORTUNES TO BENEFIT THE POOR

Daniel Guggenheim's Evidence on Social Conditions and Industrial Unrest

New York, Jan. 25.—Taxation of large fortunes, upon the death of their owners, to aid the poor, the establishment of government agencies to find work for the unemployed, and provision for the comfort of aged workers, were advocated by Daniel Guggenheim, president of the American Smelting and Refining Company in testimony at an inquiry by the Federal Commission on Industrial Relations into the great philanthropic foundations and the causes of industrial unrest.

Mr. Guggenheim said that, as a capitalist, he favored these measures, despite the fact that they constitute some of the cardinal ideas of Socialism. He also advocated "industrial democracy" wherein the worker received a portion of the profit derived from his labor.

Industrial unrest, he thought, was caused to a great extent by the increased cost of living. In his opinion the philanthropic organizations did not effect much relief from poverty, as the average worker was reluctant to accept charity, and preferred employment.

E. J. Berwind, owner of coal mines and director in many coal mining corporations and coal carrying railroads, testified that he believed directors and stockholders were not so well acquainted with labor conditions as they should be.

There were bad trusts and bad capitalists as well as bad unions, Mr. Guggenheim said. The American Smelting and Refining Company operates open shops, he testified, because it would not allow unions to run the business. The management, however, would treat with unions, or with the men collectively the same as with individual workers.

Another reason why the American Smelting and Refining Company operated open shops, Mr. Guggenheim continued, was because it did not believe that it had a right to control the men who worked for it. It had to pay what he should call and when he should go to bed. Personal liberty demanded open shops.

**GERMANY TRYING TO EMULATE DEEDS OF JANUARY, 1871**  
Forty-four Years Ago Last Two Weeks of January Were Fruitful in Victories

(Montreal Journal of Commerce.)

The desperate efforts the Germans are now making to break through the French lines after a month of comparative inactivity may be due to the desire to emulate the successes of mid-January in 1871. It is a popular plan with nations to make special efforts on the anniversaries of great victories, or on the other hand to make a supreme effort to wipe out the disgrace of a disastrous defeat upon a given day.

All Are Interested.

Mr. Hurst says that not only the hotel-keepers themselves, but the liquor dealers, the breweries and all license-holders are co-operating in the plan to help the poor. A lodge house is also being run on a like principle in Wilton avenue.

At noon hour especially the King street premises supply a lively scene, with a line-up of men going in, and a large quantity of food also going in.

"As can readily be seen," said Mr. Hurst, "it is far from a money-making affair. It is, in fact, a money-spending one, and we expect to be some few thousand dollars behind when the spring returns to the country."

Regarding the lodging of homeless ones, Mr. Hurst said that last year no fewer than 5,000 found accommodation through the efforts of clergymen and others in rounding up and directing those for whom these efforts are undertaken.

Modifi a newspaperman in Elliotville, N. Y., recently gave 25 dollars to a department store, leaving instructions that an extra dime was to be given to the first 25 purchasers. Five men pocketed the change without counting; 15 bolted for the door, and only five remained; the clerks they had received 10 cents each.

## TORONTO HOTEL KEEPERS SERVE 500 FREE MEALS

(Toronto Telegram.)

The Toronto Hotelkeepers' Association sent out a grand average of 500 free meals every day according to A. J. Hurst, who has charge of this side of the association's undertaking.

"Our efforts last year," says Mr. Hurst, "in the way of supplying help to the needy, were so encouraging that we decided to go into the matter more widely this year. On the first of January we started giving out the meal tickets. These we supply to the ministers or clergymen in all the denominations throughout the city, and we leave it entirely to their own discretion to decide whom to supply with a ticket.
