

## WARWICK.

A village in the township of Warwick, 25 miles from Sarnia, 37 from London, and seven from Watford station, on the Great Western Railway. The post-office was established in 1835; the name of the first post-master was Oscar Cleverly. The village contains four stores, two hotels, a steam grist mill, three blacksmith shops, one waggon shop, two shoe shops, one tailor shop, one harness maker, one physician, three churches and a good school. Mails daily, received 11, a. m., and dispatched 1.30. p. m. James M. Burns, post-master.
