PLANS FOR THE OPENING OF DOMINION EXHIBITION
At a meeting of the executive of the Exhibition Association held last night, some important matters were dealt with. It was announced that the band of Royal Canadian Dragoons of St. John's, Quebec, had been secured to come here as a special attraction. In connection with the opening it was decided to have Madame Melba sing, if possible. A communication was received from the Trades and Labor Council asking that there be a labor day parade, and a committee was appointed to confer with the council. It was decided to formally open the fair on Saturday afternoon, September 3, at 2 o'clock. In the matter of street lighting for fair time, Manager Hopper of the St. John Street Railway Company had previously made an offer to install 1,225 lights at a cost of \$100,000. A communication was received from the City Council yesterday. Mr. Hopper said that he would install 60 additional lights for the same money.
