

ARMY SIX TO FIVE FAVORITE OVER NAVY FOR SATURDAY'S GAME

100,000 WILL WITNESS TILT AT WINDY CITY

Largest U. S. Football Crowd in History—Soldiers' Field All Ready

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—(United Press.)—Considering that the money angle is played so prominently in the discussion of modern sports, it is singular that comparatively scant attention is paid to the income of a successful football team.

The million dollar world's series between the winners of the major league baseball pennant winners has passed the stage of a novelty since club owners became prosperous enough to build huge parks.

Tex Rickard introduced the million dollar football game to the world when he promoted the contest between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier, he approached the two million dollar prize with his Tunney-Dempsey fight and he'll get more than that if he can find a stadium big enough to hold more customers.

College football is stepping into the million dollar class with the announcement from the Harvard management that the receipts for the 1926 season probably will exceed that sum.

In the discussions of the most popular sport in the United States, the figures are quoted principally upon baseball, boxing and football. Figures on the interest manifested in racing, the money that is paid to see the thoroughbred run and the money that is exchanged by those who bet on races are seldom considered.

If the figures were available it probably would be found that there are for more classes of all ages and classes interested in racing than there are in any other sport. No sport could support alone the thousands of publications that are devoted to racing and no sport could command the sustained interest day after day and year after year that is held by the track.

Up to Nov. 8, the racing stable of Harry Payne Whitney, millionaire sportsman and social leader, had won \$75,000 in purses and before the end of the winter season the earnings may exceed the record of \$428,000 that the great Zev helped to turn in for Harry F. Sinclair.

The Whitney stable, considered by many to be the most perfect organization on the turf set out this year to set a new record for stable earnings and to shoot at a mark of 2000 wins.

The official announcement meant much to those who back their choice with cash because they became convinced that every Whitney horse sent to the post was sent out with orders to win if possible. And when they saw that they were ridden to the limit by Pony McLean, Wallen and Abel.

The Sinclair record was made with the help of the Zev but there is no Zev in the Whitney stable. The huge earnings have come from Croyden, Macaw, Noah, Backbone, Rapture, Fly Leaf, Phillette and others which is all the more to their credit.

The Pas Famous Three-Day Dog Derby To Be Held January 25, 26 and 27

Horse Racing Most Popular of Sports in United States

THE PAS, Man., Nov. 24.—(The Citizen.)—The winter carnival, of which it is the central event, will be held January 25, 26 and 27.

Fear of an international competitor is spurring local owners and drivers to early efforts in training their teams of huskies. Reports here are that Leonard Spella, with his famous team of malamutes from Alaska, will come to The Pas in an effort to wrest the purse of \$1,000 from Canadian drivers. Spella is at present in the United States training for the international dog derby circuit. Another entrant in the derby will be Emil Stoddard, The Pas musher, who holds the record time for the course.

The race this year will be run 40 miles a day for three days, under international rules, on the Saskatchewan River course. After the race the owners and drivers will take their dogs to Eastern Canada and New Hampshire to compete in events there.

It was a fast-paced contest, with a parade of dashes up and down the ice. And, like the Boston game, the pace was kept up by the goal line.

Greek Will Replace Strangler Lewis, Who Loses Deposit

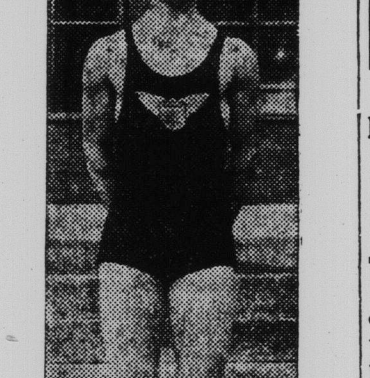
LOS ANGELES, Calif., Nov. 24.—Joe Stecher, claimant of the world's heavyweight wrestling title, has agreed to meet Jimmy London, Greek headlock artist, in a match here December 1, substituting for the bout previously arranged between Stecher and Ed "Strangler" Lewis, also a title claimant.

Stecher and Lewis had deposited \$5,000 forfeits each with the State Athletic Commission and Lou Duro, promoter of the match, gave Lewis until Tuesday in which to notify him that he intended to go through with the contest. Duro announced that half of Lewis \$5,000 when forfeited, will go to Stecher.

HITCH OCCURS IN MCCURDY PLAY-OFF

Caledonians and Wanderers Cannot Agree on Playing Field

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 24.—As the Caledonia English rugby football team, champions of Cape Breton and winners over Mount Allison in the semi-final game of the series of the McCurdy Trophy, symbolic of the English rugby championship of the Maritime Provinces, refuses to meet the Halifax Wanderers, and the Wanderers refuse to play anywhere else but in Halifax, the final match for the McCurdy Cup may not be played. Last night, C. R. Chipman, trustee of the McCurdy Cup, received a telegram from the Caledonians saying they would play either at Glace Bay or New Glasgow. This message was in reply to a wire Chipman sent the Cape Breton champions Monday evening advising of the Wanderers' terms.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 24.—Rabbit Maranville, former major league star, has been signed by the Rochester Club of the International League to play second base for the local next season. Maranville was signed as a free agent, and he will return to the manager who had a great deal to do in making the "Rabbit" one of the stars of the game. It was under George Stallings, manager of the Rochester Club, that Maranville broke into the major leagues and he was with the Braves in 1914 when the Hub City won the National League pennant.

THE Chicago Bears clinched the National Professional Football League title by defeating the Green Bay Packers, 19 to 13. The Bears marked up 10 victories and an early season tie game with the Packers.

BARRING accidents in the next few days, Pennsylvania will start the same line-up against Cornell Thanksgiving Day that has been service in the Chicago, Illinois, Penn State and Columbia games. The coaches have virtually decided on that after an informal conference on the week-end.

ROLAND CIONI, Hagerstown, Md., won the world's professional roller skating title at the Newark Armory for the fourth time when he captured the 10-mile event in the remarkable time of 31 minutes 30.8 seconds. The race was the culmination of a series of six which had been conducted throughout last week.

GEORGE WILSON and his Pacific Coast Wildcat ended the New York Yankees' six-game winning streak in an uncertain manner Saturday afternoon at the Yankee Stadium, the West Coast capturing the American League title.

MAJOR ERIC W. CAVANAUGH, NAUGHT, football coach at Boston College since 1919, has announced that he has refused to sign a new contract with the college. His present contract expires this season. Major Cavanaugh in a formal statement said he had been offered a contract by any other institution.

THE New York football Giants beat the Providence Steam Rollers by a score of 21 to 0 at the Polo Grounds Saturday, while 10,000 spectators danced in the concrete stands trying to get warm.

HARRY BUTLER, 18, a member of the football squad of Mount St. Mary's College at Emmitsburg, Md., was brought to the Newark Hospital at Gettysburg, Pa., suffering from what physicians called was a broken neck. The accident was said to have occurred in a scrimmage, but no details were known.

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No Report Yet

The Amherst News calls attention to the fact that Neil R. MacArthur, of Glace Bay, Crown Prosecutor for Cape Breton, has not made a report to the M. P. B. A. U. C. upon the C. B. Chamber of Deputies, that were responsible for a meeting of inquiry in Amherst several weeks ago at the call of President S. F. Doyle. MacArthur, as a matter of fact, has received no instruction in regard to conducting an investigation and actually does not know what steps to take. Liquor Pact Between America And France

PARIS, Nov. 24.—Ratification of a convention with the United States for the repression of bootlegging liquor into that country has been recommended by the foreign affairs committee of the Chamber of Deputies. The liquor treaty, based largely on that made with Great Britain in 1924, gives the right to American officials to search vessels suspected of bootlegging within an hour's ride of the coast, taking the place of the three-mile limit.
