Not to be discouraged, Fred strode into the house, deposited his bag in a chair, and declared, "I want a bed for the night."

"That's rather like Fred," said the householder. "What was your father's name?"

"It's all right, Jack, old man. I'll tell you the names of the entire family if you like," came the reply, and when, sure enough, he had recited off all the names, he was received with open arms.
