Sir,—

Whereas by agreement, dated the twelith day of September, 1911, between His Majesty the King, the City of St. John and the Canadian Pacific Railway, it was then agreed by His Majesty with the City of St. John as follows:—

"That His Majesty will build upon the lands hereinbefore conveyed to him such and so many docks or plers as may be necessary for the handling of trade through the Port of Saint John (always subject to the provision of funds therefor by vote of Parliament) and will by means of such docks or plers or by some other suitable structure and by filling in between such docks, piers or other structure, and the outer or eastern and southeastern limits of the lands hereby leased to the company provide protection so that material which may be filled in upon the land hereinbefore leased to the company will not be washed away by the action of the sea thereon."

Now, therefore, the City of St. John, believing that a necessity has arisen for a further construction of docks or piers and also the completion of the equipment of those already constructed with grain conveyor galleries, hereby respectfully request His Majesty to proceed with the construction of grain conveyors to berths 7, 14, 14 extension, and 16, and in addition to construct another pier south of Pier and 16, and in addition to con-struct another pier south of Pier 16, this season.


